A CRUISE IN BRUNSWICK

Told In a Very Interesting Article

Ben A. Eastman Writes in "Forest and Stream," of a Trip Through New Brunswick in Search of Game.

"Cruising in New Brunswick" is the subject of an interesting article in "Forest and Stream," written by Ben A. Eastman of Barre. We reproduce the article entire:

In the fall of 1904, while returning from a moose hunting trip up the Tobique, I formed the acquaintance of a hunter returning from a similar trip in the Miramichi country. We were thrown together on the night train coming down through Maine. He was suffering from a badly infected foot, while my mind was heavily burdened with thoughts of leaving behind a wounded moose that must die.

One year later found us together following pointer and setter through the alder swamps of Vermont. It was during this hunt in the fall of 1905 that we planned the outing of which I am about to write. Our original scheme was "to go it alone," having had some bitter experiences with guides.

By agreement, on Sept. 16, I met my friend Fred in Boston at the North station. On Sept. 17, a little after dawn, we arrived at Deaktown, our destination.
