

I SHALL NOT RUN AWAY

Says Wm. J. Bryan of Nomination

WILLING TO BE DRAFTED

But Is Not a Candidate Seeking the Democratic Nomination—Will Answer Question, "What Is a Democrat?"

Washington, D. C., Nov. 22.—Having twice led the party and twice been defeated, I am no longer a candidate, but if I am drafted I shall not run away. This is William J. Bryan's latest expression concerning renomination, given in an interview today. It is announced that on the occasion of the great levee feast next Tuesday night at the Raleigh hotel, to be attended by prominent members of the party from all over the country, Bryan will answer the much discussed question, "What is a Democrat?"

ADVERTISED FIGHT STOPPED BY MILITIA

Gov. Cummins of Iowa Decided it Was Not to Be a "Scientific Sparring Exhibition" Only and Called it Off.

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 22.—Gov. Cummins took a hand in Davenport's widely advertised McFarland-Herman prize fight last evening and with the aid of a company of the Iowa National Guard stopped it before it began. Four thousand or more seats had been sold for the fight and a thousand people came in special trains from Chicago and other cities. Gov. Cummins satisfied himself that the fight was not to be a mere "scientific sparring exhibition" as it had been advertised, and he ordered the militia at Davenport to take possession at the Coliseum, where the fight was to take place.

GAIN IN CANADA'S TRADE

Total Increase of About \$28,000,000 in Seven Months. Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 22.—For the seven months ended with October, Canada's aggregated trade shows a gain of about \$28,000,000 as compared with the same time last year. The increase is in imports. The total imports for the seven months show were \$226,995,000 or a gain of \$21,155,000. The decrease in foreign exports was about \$4,000,000 so that there will be an increase in domestic exports of over \$25,000,000, leaving the increase in the aggregate trade at about \$28,000,000. There was an increase in the output of the mine of about \$2,000,000 in agriculture, \$9,000,000 and about \$1,000,000 in manufactures. There was a decrease of nearly \$1,000,000 in forest products of about \$9,000,000 in animals and their products and fisheries remain about the same.

FOG HOLDS UP THE MAURETANIA

Arrived Off Sandy Hook Lightship at 9:50 A. M., and Is Anchored Outside Till Fog Lifts. New York, Nov. 22.—The steamer Mauretania arrived off Sandy Hook lightship at 9:50 a. m. and at 10:30 the captain reported he was anchored outside the hook and would not attempt a passage of the channel to quarantine until the fog, which delayed his arrival, had lifted.

New World's Billiard Record.

St. Louis, Nov. 22.—Breaking the world's record for averages and sweeping his opponent before him with brilliant and rapid play, Frank P. Day of St. Louis last night defeated Alfred De Oro of New York in the twenty-fifth game of the national three cushion billiard championship tournament by a score of 50 to 29 in 55 minutes. Day's average was 1.32 more than the former record. In the short period of play Day made five runs of four each and two of five. De Oro made a high run of 7 and finished with an average of .53.

NASI'S LAWYERS MISBEHAVING.

Abandon Their Client Owing to the Certainty of Conviction of the Senate. Rome, Nov. 22.—The trial of Massimo Nasi, the former minister of public instruction, who is charged with having defrauded the state treasury, is resulting daily in incidents and occurrences more or less scandalous and which are distinctly unbecoming for the Italian Senate. The case is being heard by the Senate, sitting as a high court. Nasi's lawyers, backed by their clients, are behaving in an unbecoming manner. They refuse to obey the president of the Senate, they use strong language before the court, they yell and shout during the hearing, and their conduct generally has brought forth protest from the senators. Their objection to any control resulted Wednesday in their withdrawal from the case, and they sent a letter to the president of the court, saying they abandoned their client in order to protect themselves in the complete exercise of their functions. When this occurred the president adjourned the sitting, but he ordered Nasi's lawyers to be present yesterday, threatening them otherwise with forcible arrest for contempt of court.

DRAPER NEWPORT PLANT BURNED

Loss of \$40,000 in Bobbin Roughing Works, Second Destruction in Year. Newport, N. H., Nov. 22.—The bobbin roughing plant of the Draper Manufacturing company of Hopedale, Mass., was destroyed by fire yesterday, causing a loss estimated at about \$40,000. The apparatus had a run of two miles from Newport village, but saved the nearby buildings. The loss is covered by insurance.

POURING INTO BOSTON.

Football Enthusiasts Gathering For The Harvard-Yale Game. Boston, Nov. 22.—Advance parties of football enthusiasts, mostly from the Harvard-Yale game began arriving in this city yesterday. A little band of followers of the blue in this city went out to Auburndale yesterday afternoon to greet the players upon their arrival from New Haven.

MRS. HARTJE WINS AGAIN

Pennsylvania Superior Court Affirms the Decision of County Tribunal. Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 22.—Mrs. Mary Scott Hartje, who was sued for divorce by her husband, P. Augustus Hartje, the Pittsburgh millionaire, was a complete victory in the Pennsylvania superior court here yesterday, when that tribunal affirmed in its entirety the decision of the Allegheny county court, which refused to grant Hartje a divorce.

UPRISING IMMINENT.

King of Portugal Divides His Army—Trade Paralyzed. Lisbon, Portugal, Nov. 22.—King Carlos gave orders today for the concentration in Lisbon of all regiments, on whose loyalty he thinks he can rely. Those in which there is believed to be much dissatisfaction are being sent to the provinces. A Republican uprising against the crown and Premier Franco who still refuses to call a parliament together is imminent. Commercial conditions are in the utmost difficulty of the political situation. Trade is paralyzed.

YOUNG MAN ELECTROCUTED.

A Princeton Student Came in Contact With a Live Wire. Princeton, N. J., Nov. 22.—James T. Walker, jr., a freshman in Princeton university, was shocked to death by a live wire yesterday. It had begun to rain and, running to the dormitory, Walker shouted to a friend on the third floor to toss down his rubber coat. As the coat fell it caught on a live wire about 20 feet in the air. Walker climbed an iron pole to get it but, coming in contact with the wires, received a shock of 2,500 volts and was instantly killed.

WATERMAN IN ISSANE HOSPITAL.

Waterbury, Nov. 22.—J. H. Quimby, the jailer of Essex county, and Deputy Sheriff Henry McGinnis brought Robert Waterman to the state hospital Wednesday night. Waterman was sentenced to hard labor in state prison but before he was taken there he cut his throat with a jack knife and has since been pronounced insane.
