**EX-MAYOR BARCLAY.**

Although ex-Mayor William Barclay had lately retired somewhat from the activities in which he always took a keen interest, more because of ill health than for any other cause, his removal by death will be greatly felt in many circles of the community. For years he took a leading part in the city's chief industry and was consequently one of the ablest counselors among his associates whenever the matters of common concern arose. In the lodge, he was devoted and full of zeal. In the church, he took a kindly interest. In civic life, he was a good citizen, and what more could be said in this respect? During the three years when he stood officially at the head of the municipality, his rugged integrity won him the respect of all men; even though some may have had variance in view, they nevertheless recognized in him a man of honest purpose. He was loyal to his city and was much concerned in its progress. Toward his adopted country he exhibited much patriotism. So Mayor Barclay will be missed.

**LET WELL ENOUGH ALONE.**

There is a disposition on the part of some people to stir up the dead case, which ended in Chittenden county court recently in the acquittal of the respondent of the charge of cruelty to his horse. The case takes on more importance because the respondent is the husband of President Ida Read of the State W. C. T. U.; and the charge is still made by friends of the latter that the allegation of cruelty was brought as mere persecution of a good woman and her cause, in the hope of entangling Mrs. Read in a noxious case. Here, for instance, is one statement: "It seems a shame that that poor old respectable couple, Mr. and Mrs. Read, should be hounded to distraction in their declining years, just because they drove a horse with a caulked ankle once too often." That gives expression to quite a bit of public opinion in some parts of the state. It does seem a shame that either Mr. or Mrs. Read should have been dragged into a case of this sort; but, on the other hand, it seems that there really was no other way for the prosecuting attorney than to try the case, on the representations, which appeared to be made in good faith. That there was hounding on the part of any witnesses for the prosecution does not follow, although the prominence of the people might give color to such a belief. However, the Times does not consider that the prosecution was brought in that spirit; and it furthermore believes that since the court has acquitted the respondent, the better way would be to drop the discussion.
