### SLAVE TRAPS FOR WHITE AND BLACK.

Laws Which Assistant Attorney General Russell Condemns in Report on Feignage.

Washington, Dec. 3.—In a report concerning his findings relating to poeage in the South, Assistant Attorney General Charles W. Russell recommends that the statute relating to slavery be amended so as to destroy all doubts as to the meaning of "involuntary servitude." He also suggests changes in state laws.

He says: "Whether constitutional or not and whether originally intended to be used as a trap for the enslavement of white workmen as well as black, and ought to be repealed, or amended." Mr. Russell stated his impression that interested persons sometimes seek to make it appear that the prosecution of poeage cases is the result of a desire to injure Southern industries in favor of rivals in the North, and then says: "The thing to do is not to invent defenses or excuses or to raise false cries, but to get rid of the evil."

### 21 RUSSIAN MUTINEERS ARE SENTENCED TO DIE.

24 of Those Implicated in Vladivostok Disorders Go to Gallies.

Vladivostok, Dec. 3.—The court-martial that has been trying the men who participated in the recent mutinies at this port handed down its findings yesterday.

Twenty-one men were sentenced to death, thirty-four were sent to the galleys, 140 were imprisoned for various terms, and five were acquitted.

# VORYS GIVES ALL TO TAFT

## He Resigns Office of Insurance Commissioner

### THIS RELIEVES GOVERNOR

He Promptly Makes Another Appointment—Political Difference of the Senate Caused Some Complications.

Columbus, O., Dec. 3.—Arthur I. Vorys, manager of the movement to secure the presidential nomination of Secretary Taft, has resigned his office of state insurance commissioner, to take effect on Jan. 1, in order to give his entire time thereafter to the Taft interest. This action relieves Governor Harris of embarrassment, since the law provides that when the Senate has rejected an appointment, the governor shall send in a "new" one. # THE DOUMA ON TAIAL

## Czar Nicholas Awaiting His Work

### STILL MORE REPRESSION

In Finland Is Feared—Assistant to Governor Is General Zane—He Was One of the Instruments of Bobrikoff's Tyranny.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 3.—Emperor Nicholas received and perused with coldness a copy of the address of the Douma in reply to the speech from the throne at the opening of the Parliament. On the margin of the document he wrote the following note: "I am ready to believe the expressed sentiments. I await productive work."

The reappointment of Major General Zane as assistant to Nicholas N. Gerhard, governor-general of Finland, is considered by evidence of an intention to restore the "Bobrikoff" policy in Finland. Major General Zane was formerly director of the Bobrikoff chancellery.

General Count Bobrikoff, assassinated in June, 1904, who was appointed governor-general of Finland in 1899, made himself very unpopular by his severe measures against the press of Finland and the stern manner in which he followed out the policy of Russia toward the Finns. This led to serious rioting at Helsinki in 1902, which was suppressed by Cossacks. The last recorded act of General Bobrikoff was in March, 1904, when he issued a proclamation forbidding the people to darken their windows at "unusual hours." People who chose to go to bed before ten o'clock at night were subject to heavy fines. This step was due to the neglect of the Finns to illuminate their houses in honor of the beginning of the war with Japan.

### LINCOLN MADE NO OFFER TO PAY FOR SLAVES.

Prof. Nash of Confederate Senate Held Conference Report—"Must Come Back to Union First."

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 3.—Prof. James H. Nash of the Confederate Senate, says that President Lincoln made no offer to the South to pay for her slaves, and appears to have settled a momentous question that has been discussed both in the North and South for nearly 50 years.

It was said that the offer was made to Alexander H. Stephens, Vice-President of the Confederacy, at the Hampton Roads conference, in return for a cessation of hostilities. Prof. Nash heard a report of this conference and told what it contained at a banquet given by the alumni of Furman university. He was a member of the class of 1856.

Mr. Nash says that the only intimation President Lincoln ever made of offering to pay for the slaves was made as a private citizen after the settlement of hostilities and the close of the war. "I was secretary of the Confederate Senate during its entire existence. I heard the report in the Senate of the confederate commission, which was composed of Vice-President Stephens, R. M. T. Hunter and Secretary of War Campbell of the Confederate side, and President Lincoln and Mr. Seward of the Union side. The conference was arranged to meet at Hampton Roads, for the purpose of adjusting negotiations and bringing about a cessation of hostilities and to end the war. The real truth of this conference has been published by Mr. Stephens in his 'War Between the States.'

"I was in the Senate when Mr. Stephens gave an account of the conference and its results in secret session. 'The first and only proposition that Mr. Lincoln and Mr. Seward made the South on behalf of the Union was that the confederacy must first lay down arms and come into the Union before negotiations would be considered, and the conference was declared off and thus ended.'

# "RESERVE NOT SUFFICIENT"

This the Currency Trouble, Says Fowler

### HE DECLARES IMMEDIATE

Legislation to Be Necessary—Call for Bank Statements Expected—This, It Is Thought, Will Do Much to Restore Confidence.

New York, Dec. 3.—Charles N. Fowler, chairman of the House committee on banking and currency, made the following statement yesterday respecting the outlook for financial legislation in the Sixtieth Congress: "There certainly should be some remedial legislation, and I can assure you that the members of the committee on banking and currency will bend their energies to that end. At the close of the last session of Congress said that the condition of our finances and currency was such that it would of necessity lead to the destruction of our property. Again I now declare that if this government continues its present policy of injecting into the arteries of trade and commerce a fixed bond secured currency—by exchanging securities, by long speculation, by treasury manipulation, by executive order or by any other form of thimble-rigging—we shall continue to move, but with greatly accelerated speed, toward a commercial crisis compared with which the present panic is only a pleasant summer outing."

"Our condition this fall has been one of real prosperity. Our crops are worth about \$7,000,000,000, the products of our mines about \$1,400,000,000, our manufactured products about \$170,000,000,000—a total of \$25,000,000,000. Notwithstanding all this, and wholly because of the maladministration of our finances, we are in a state of panic. "We have today in the banks of this country about \$12,000,000,000 of deposits and about the same amount of outstanding loans. Against this fabulous sum the banks hold as reserve about \$900,000,000, or less than 8 per cent. And even this 8 per cent. reserve, nearly one-quarter—\$200,000,000—is in banknotes, a mere credit, a mere promise to pay."

Several in Brooklyn to Be Investigated.

New York, Dec. 3.—The Kings county grand jury for December, it is learned, will start investigating the affairs of the closed Brooklyn banking institutions yesterday. During the week the jury will look into the affairs of the Borough and Brooklyn banks and the Jenkins and Williamsburg Trust companies, yesterday it went especially into the affairs of the Borough bank. Assistant District Attorney Elder will take up the withdrawal of money from the Borough bank after banking hours. The receivers for the bank reported that directors and their friends had withdrawn more than \$200,000 in this manner.

A committee of depositors of the Borough bank held a meeting in Brooklyn after which a statement was issued declaring that the report of the receiver that the bank cash now in the hands of the banking department only amounted to \$477,127 was incorrect. The assertion was made by the depositors' committee in its statement that the Borough bank has \$1,150,000 on deposit with other institutions, and that the bank has in fact available cash to the amount of \$655,733.

FINANCIAL CONDITIONS BETTER, SAYS CORTELYOU.

Declares Banks Will Resume Cash Payments by End of Week.

Washington, Dec. 3.—Secretary Cortelyou told members of Congress who called on him yesterday that financial conditions were rapidly growing better. He said cash payments would be resumed in the banks all over the country by the end of the week.

### ONLY BRYAN IN SIGHT.

This the View of Many Democrats in Congress.

New York, Dec. 3.—Out of seventy-six Democratic senators and representatives polled in Washington by the New York World, forty-four declare unequivocally that the recent statement of William J. Bryan that he is a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the presidency eliminates all other candidates. Practically all of them believe that he should run on a conservative platform, although there is a wide difference in opinion as to what that platform should be. Of those who do not consider that Bryan is the only man, only one, Senator Bristell of Louisiana, is definite in naming a candidate. He comes out flatfooted for Governor Johnson of Minnesota.

BEVERIDGE WANTS TO INVESTIGATE TARIFF.

Senator Will Introduce Bill to Have Commission Appointed.

Washington, Dec. 3.—Senator Beveridge of Indiana has determined to introduce a bill for a tariff commission to investigate the workings of the Dingley schedules with a view to revision after the next presidential election. He has declared his intention of pressing it to a passage, if possible, and he expects strong backing from revisionists in Senate and House.

BUTLER SHOT THEBAUD DURING FIT OF INSANITY

Ossining Coroner Gives Verdict—Stops Further Inquiry Into Case.

Ossining, N. Y., Dec. 3.—Coroner A. I. Squire of this village said yesterday that he would make no further inquiry into the shooting of Paul G. Thebaud, jr., on Nov. 10, and the subsequent suicide of John Bjorlin, butler for the Thebaud family.

The coroner said that he had taken the statement of young Thebaud Sunday night and that there appeared to be no doubt that the butler, in a fit of insanity resulting from drink, had shot his employer's son and then taken his own life.

Thebaud is now able to be around the house and will soon be out again.

EXPECT NICHOLAS TO VISIT ITALIAN KING.

Socialists Threaten to Hoot Russian Emperor Out of Rome.

Rome, Dec. 3.—The conclusion of the Italo-Russian treaty of commerce and navigation and the approaching visit of a Russian squadron to the Italian coast are considered here as preparatory to the return by the emperor of Russia of the visit which King Victor several years ago.

This visit was not returned in 1902, as had been arranged, because the Socialists threatened to hoot the Russian emperor out of Rome.

### EXPLOSION AND FIRE, TWO MEN MAY DIE.

Oil Works Employes at Williamsburg Form Fire Brigade and Fight Flames.

New York, Dec. 3.—During a fire following an explosion in the Kings county oil works, Williamsburg, several men were hurt, of whom two may die. The employes formed a fire brigade and thus fought the flames. There were smaller explosions, but the fire which followed these did not spread.

The first fire spread to a shed, and while the men were trying to extinguish the blaze there part of the roof gave way and six men were caught under its beams. Several were severely burned.

### HE LIVES ON CACTUS AND WORKS 18 HOURS A DAY

Dr. Ladone Seeks to Prove Its Value as a Food.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 3.—In an effort to prove that thornless cactus, as an article of diet, contains properties sufficient to enable a man to continue working eighteen hours a day, Dr. Leon F. Ladone has been subsisting exclusively upon cactus since last Friday, supplemented by a few nuts and a small quantity of celery.

A stenographer and secretary, with Dr. Ladone, constitute a "cactus squad" which will continue on this novel diet for a period of two weeks.

### MANY MILLS RESUME.

Temporary Shutdown at an End in Nearly All New England Mills.

Boston, Dec. 3.—Thousands of mill operatives throughout New England, most of whom are employed in the various textile manufacturing establishments, resumed work yesterday after curtailment shut-downs varying from three days to a week or more in length. In most cases where work was resumed yesterday it was understood that the mills hereafter would be run on full time, with a full complement of help.

### HAU'S SENTENCE COMMUTED.

He Is to Be Imprisoned for Life for the Murder of His Mother-in-law.

Karlsruhe, Dec. 3.—The death sentence passed upon Karl Hau for the murder of his mother-in-law, Frau Molitor, is commuted to life imprisonment.
