

Ahearn, the deposed president whom Governor Hughes deposed, Martin W. Littleton, his counsel, got Justice Trux out of bed at 5 o'clock yesterday morning and obtained a temporary injunction restraining any action in connection with the governor's order until the matter can be argued before a court.

The order was directed against Mayor McClellan and County Clerk Dooling. The order is returnable on Friday. It was granted on the ground that the taxpayers' money is involved and that the decision of the governor may involve the needless expenditure of it.
