## FREE TO RHEUMATISM SUFFERERS

ABOUT THE STATE.

Items of Interest Gleaned from Our Exchanges.

It is expected that a new Roman Catholic church will be erected in Ferris next spring at a cost of \$25,000.

The United Shirt & Collar Co.'s factory at Fair Haven which has been running four days a week, began a five day schedule Monday.

The condition of Martin Hayes, of Castleton, who was blown up at the quarry of the Fair Haven State Co., at Lake Bomosee, is slightly improved and there are strong hopes of his recovery.

The Snowflake Canning Co., Brattleboro, has increased the price to be paid to farmers for sweet corn next season. It is now offering \$10 a ton for corn delivered at the factory or \$15 a ton and freight. This is \$2 more than was paid last season. The company hopes to get 330 acres guaranteed for next season, and at the price offered no difficulty is expected.

The trustees of Brightlook hospital St. Johnsbury, have engaged Mrs. Flora E. Lovejoy, of St. Johnsbury, as matron and general superintendent, and Miss Myrtle H. Miller of Boston, as head nurse. The latter has charge of one of the large wards at the Massachusetts General hospital, the new hospital, which has been erected this year on a most slightly place in the village, will be ready for use next month.

Every cell in the Rutland city jail was occupied last Sunday evening when the local police had gathered in eight intoxicated prisoners, consisting of first, second and third offense men. The eight prisoners tried Monday morning all pleaded guilty and with the exception of three paid their fines. One man was allowed to take the pledge, so he did not have to pay the fine but he had to settle the costs, which amounted to \$5.75. The respondent in this case was Edward Kaneby.

Joseph E. Buckingham, the new superintendent of the Brattleboro fire alarm system, assisted by a fire alarm expert, has been overhauling the system and has found that in many places the wires are almost eaten off with rust. For some months the system has not worked satisfactorily, and the trouble appears to be due to the fact that the wires, which were put in sixteen years ago, are practically worn out. It is probable that a new three-wire system will have to be installed and the old wires replaced with new ones.

Work at State Library.

A recent bulletin issued from the office of the secretary of the state board of health contains the following interesting statistics:

In the last three months the laboratory has accomplished a very large amount of work. About 1,600 specimens other than milk have been examined. Examinations will have to be practically clean milk; seven before standard; one was watered. This makes three specimens of watered milk found in the last six months. All of these vendors have been fined each \$50, which they paid.

Of these low standard 19 samples were from nearly as many Burlington dealers.

The one found watered was from a dealer in Cuttingville.

A total of 51 samples were found below standard of the 18.

A total of 2,555 cases of communicable diseases were reported to the secretary of the board from May 11 to November 10 inclusive. Of these 94 were whooping cough, 122 measles, 40 smallpox, 12 scarletina, 199 diphtheria and croup, 162 chickenpox, 272 mumps, 279 German measles, 11 pneumonia, 4 erysipelas, and one meningitis.

The laboratory examined 158 samples of ground water and 13 of surface water from August to November. Of these 123 ground and 16 samples of surface water were found polluted.

Of the 487 examinations of culture for diphtheria 150 were found positive; of 313 for tuberculosis 99 were positive; of 167 for typhoid fever, 7 were positive.

Ninety samples of liquor were analyzed and 23 found to be illegal.

Of 39 samples of miscellaneous food examined 11 were illegal; of 37 drugs, 24 were illegal; of non-alcoholic beverages 45 out of 49 were found illegal.

Five autopsies were made by the director of the laboratory and his assistants, 25 medico-legal examinations, and 49 miscellaneous examinations.

## 707 CATTLE KILLED

### OUT OF 9,680 TESTED

State Cattle Commissioner Wilson of Arlington Makes His Report to Governor Proctor.

State Cattle Commissioner H. S. Wilson of Arlington has made a report to the governor covering the transactions of his office for the eight months ending September 1 from which it is seen that 9,680 head of cattle have been tested for tuberculosis. Of these 707 were found diseased and killed and for which the state paid \$17,123.32, or an average of \$24.21 per head.

During the same period 734 cattle were admitted into the state by permit.

There was paid to shippers of milk cows into the state of Massachusetts \$1,358 for 62 head of cattle found diseased and killed by the Massachusetts authorities. The purchase price of these cows was \$2,976.

There have been 15 horses tested for glanders of which 12 were found diseased and for which was paid \$366, or an average of \$30.50.

There was paid to veterinarians for services \$3,950 and for expenses \$1,177.64 a total of \$5,097.64.

As yet all cattle tested and found diseased and killed have either been buried or burned on the premises of the owners.

The provisions of law giving the commissioner discretionary power to ship condemned cattle to fertilizer or rendering plant will not be taken advantage of except from actual necessity and when desired by owners on account of frozen ground.

In the work of testing which has been more extensive than ever before, Commissioner Wilson has followed the wise plan of securing the best veterinary available in the section where the work was to be done instead of employing two or three veterinarians to do all the work throughout the state as was done by some of his predecessors.
