COMPULSORY SIGNATURES ON E. R. TICKETS OPPOSED.

Requirement of Legal, But Brokers Want It Annulled.

Chicago, Dec. 18.—A demand that all railroad tickets be issued to "beaters" without the purchaser being compelled to affix his signature was made at a meeting of the executive committee of the National Ticket Brokers' association here Monday.

A recent decision of the United States Supreme court having held that the requirement of a signature was legal, Chairman F. T. Lindenberg of Detroit laid the decision before the committee and said:

"It's up to us now to have legislation enacted which will remove this signature business. Tickets should be made legal fare, just the same as the money of our land, good for what it stipulates without restrictions."

CELEBRATE THE 100TH WHITTIER ANNIVERSARY

Many Schools in New England Commemorate the Poet's Birthday.

Boston, Dec. 18.—The one hundredth anniversary of the birth of John Greenleaf Whittier, which occurred yesterday was marked by commemorative observances in many schools and by literary societies in many sections of the country, of which he is generally considered one of the most beloved poets.

The centennial program in New England centers about Amesbury, where the poet lived a greater part of his life.

8,000 MEN ON STRIKE IN CHILIAN NITRATE FIELDS

Warships and Troops Sent to the Troubled Districts.

Santiago, Chili, Dec. 18.—The workmen in the Tarapaca nitrate fields have gone out on strike. The movement is a serious one, not less than 8,000 men having quit work, and business is paralyzed. The situation at Iquique is critical.
