MORE CARS FOR SHIPPING.

"CONFUSION WORSE CONFOUNDED."
 Doesn't Rutland recall the disastrous fire of two years ago? Apparently not, since it permits a disorganized state of affairs in its fire department. The complaint is made that the equipment is not adequate and that there is internal discord between the fire committee of the city government and the head of the fire department, by reason of which the latter has been suspended, leaving the remainder of the fire fighters in a demoralized condition. It must certainly fall within the jurisdiction of the city council, of which the fire committee is merely a part, to settle this thing. It seems incumbent on the council, then, to take the reins in hand and to remove the present confusion.
