

A HEAVY INCREASE
IN IMMIGRATION.
November Total Beats That of Last Year
25 Per Cent.—Two More
Japanese.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 24.—A 25 per
cent. increase over the same period last
year in immigration to the United
States is shown in the monthly state-
ment of the bureau of immigration, cov-
ering the month of November. In that
month, 117,476 immigrants arrived, as
against 94,921 in November, 1906. A
feature of the statement is the fact
that but two more Japanese came to
the United States in November, 1907,
than in 1906, the figures being placed
at 1,492 and 1,490 respectively.

Congressman Haskins is after a fed-
eral building for his own town, Brattle-
boro.

Bellevue Falls has as yet failed to sub-
scribe \$4,000 for the establishment of
the Oxford Lumber company there.

The reading room of the St. Albans
public library was open last Sunday
afternoon for the first time, and a num-
ber of young men availed themselves of
the opportunity.

Among the old men still in the harness
is Stillman White, a Bristol blacksmith,
at the age of 87. Another is Chester
Whitaker of Hardwick, aged 85, who

The census of Bakerfield, as conducted
by the home department secretary of
the Vermont State Sunday School as-
sociation, shows there are 334 Method-
ists, 267 Catholics, 188 Congregational-

Seventh-day Adventists, two Unitarians
and 88 who expressed no preference.

Two Vermont boys will receive their
commissions as ensigns in the United
States navy shortly, having served their
two years of active duty following grad-

are both from St. Johnsbury, Leigh
Noyes, now on the gunboat Helix, and
Henry G. Fuller of the cruiser Colorado.

New Theatre for St. Johnsbury.
A St. Johnsbury syndicate of five
young men has leased Music hall from
the St. Johnsbury Y. M. C. A. for five
years and will at once renovate the
property by enlarging the stage and
making other improvements preparatory
to getting a line of first-class shows.
The company will be known as the New
Music Hall company, with the follow-
ing officers: E. Carter, president; C. H.
Dumpey, secretary; Harry W. Ran-
dall, treasurer; Carl H. Turner, man-
ager; E. A. Kingsley, musical director.
The lease takes effect January 1 and
the syndicate will open the house early
in February. The Music hall building is
the old North Congregational church,
which was given to the Y. M. C. A. when
the new North church was built in 1878.
It is the largest auditorium in town,
seating 1,100 persons, but has been un-
suitable for theatrical purposes because
of its small stage and lack of stage
settings. Since the Opera house opera
was razed to the ground a few years
ago, St. Johnsbury has been devoid of
some of the leading companies on the
road.
