RUSSIA REFUSES GRANT TO CREATE A MONOPOLY

Will Not Sanction Sale of Nephthalene-Bearing Bakur Lands.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 7.—The council of the empire upholds the refusal of the Senate to sanction the proposed sale of large parcels of nephthalene-bearing land in the Bakur district to big producers, including M. Nolei, the proprietor of extensive oil fields in the Caucasus.

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The reason for the refusal is that it would encourage a great monopoly against the interests of the consumers.

Adjourns After Four Minutes, Owing to Death of Mr. Mallory.

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Liability Law of Employers Ruled Void.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 7.—In an opinion by Justice White, the supreme court of the United States yesterday held to be unconstitutional the congressional enactment of June 11, 1906, known as "the employers' liability law," making railroad and other common carriers responsible to employees in accidents due to the negligence of fellow-employees or to ineffective appliances.

BROWNSON'S LETTER TO PUBLIC.

President Explains That It Was "Inadvertently Omitted."

Washington, Jan. 7.—The President yesterday made public a letter of Admiral Brownson, who resigned as chief of the Navigation Bureau, of the Navy Department, with the explanation that it "was inadvertently omitted" from the correspondence made public.

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TO DELVE "LITTLE EGYPT'S" DEATH IN GOTHAM.

Body of Principal in Seelye Dinner Found in Her Flat by Sister; Suspicion of Violence.

New York, Jan. 7.—"Little Egypt," the original "Little Egypt," the dancer who was a guest of Herbert Barium Seelye, grandson of P. T. Barium, the showman, when Capt. Chapman made his sensational raid at Sherry's, a little over 10 years ago, was found dead in her apartments on the top floor of 226 West Thirty-seventh street.

When the Seelye affair kept a throng of visitors calling on her she put the name Mrs. Michael Harper over her door bell to divert attention from her identity, and she was so known afterward.

Her sister, Mrs. Frank Connell, of no. 241 West Thirty-sixth street, is her only near relative here.

Katherine Devine was 36 years old and never married. She recently took part in a burlesque show in the London theatre in the Hammer, under the management of Sullivan and Kraus, and was under engagement to go to Philadelphia. She was to have started for Philadelphia Thursday, and her sister believed she had done so.

No letter came from Katherine to Mrs. Connell on Friday or Saturday, and Mrs. Connell, who is married, and the sisters were devoted to each other. When she went to the apartment Mrs. Connell found her sister in her bed, surrounded by countless pictures of herself and other stage women, her jewelry lying about and her money untouched on a bureau. The gas was dimly lighted in her bedroom and in other rooms of the flat, and there was a heavy odor of coal gas.

Every window and door in the flat was closed, but a door was found with a spring lock which could have been closed by anyone leaving the place, and would have been locked behind him.

While the coroner was investigating, Thomas Stewart, a clerk in the Arlington hotel, called to see Miss Devine. Coroner Harburger subjected Stewart to a cross-examination, and was informed he had spent Wednesday evening until midnight with the dancer.

PRINCE DESAGAN SUES BONI FOR ASSAULT.

Rumor that the Latter Is to Remarry Mme. Gould—She Will Not Deny It.

Paris, Jan. 7.—In fulfillment of the intention he announced on Friday, Prince Heli de Sagan has filed suit for assault against Count Boni de Castellane, asking for damages. The action will be taken up before the court on Jan. 21.

It is rumored that Count Boni will shortly remarry Mme. Gould. Mme. Gould is now staying at her country chateau. She refuses to confirm or deny the rumor.

New York, Jan. 7.—Mrs. Anna Gould, divorced wife of Count Boni de Castellane, will soon come to this country to take up her residence. She has already made a formal statement of her intention to do so, and, under a circular issued by the state department, she has one year from Nov. 30 to resume American citizenship.

This does not mean, however, that Mme. Gould will reside permanently in the United States. This would involve separation from her children, to whom she is devoted. These must be sent twice a week to their grandmother's house, where the father may see them.

Mme. Gould has twice denied that she and the Prince de Sagan were engaged. Should she marry, she will forfeit the charge of her children to their father, who will also have a considerable allowance.

RUMOR OF A VANDERBILT \$5,000,000 LOAN TO MOSCOW

Said to Be for Street Railroads—Story Lacks Confirmation.

London, Jan. 7.—A local news agency says that one of the Vanderbilts has taken a municipal loan of the city of Moscow for 10,000,000 rubles (\$5,000,000) for the construction of street railroads. The report, however, is discredited by American financial houses here.

In financial circles here no confirmation of the London cable report could be obtained. New York Central railroad officials denied any knowledge of such a deal.

FRANCO-AMERICAN TARIFF NEGOTIATIONS A SUCCESS.

Agreement to Be Signed in Paris Today or Tomorrow.

Paris, Jan. 7.—The government has been advised by M. Jusserand, the French ambassador at Washington that the Franco-American tariff negotiations at Washington have been successfully terminated and that the agreement will probably be signed in that city today or tomorrow.

ALL THE BANKS AT OMAHA ARE NOW ON CASH BASIS

All Clearing-house Checks Being Cancelled.

Omaha, Neb., Jan. 7.—Banks in the Omaha clearing-house association yesterday began cancelling all clearing-house checks as presented.

All the banks are now wholly on a cash basis.

LONDON IS ON SKATES AFTER WEEK OF FREEZING

But Many Deaths Result from Accidents and Exposure.

London, Jan. 7.—A week's hard frost has permitted the indulgence of skating by thousands and has led to many deaths through accidents on the ice, as well as through exposure.

LEOPOLD IN DIFFICULTY

Belgian King's Trouble in Getting Premier

MAY MEAN CONCESSIONS

American Explorers Fight the Natives—Surveying Grants Are Made to American Rubber Company.

Brussels, Jan. 7.—It is expected that the premiership made vacant by the death of M. de Troos on Dec. 31 will be offered to M. Schollaert, president of the Chamber of Deputies, but it is understood that he will accept only on condition that King Leopold make important concessions on the Congo question.

The condition of the king, who is suffering from the gout, is becoming worse. It is declared that the bone of one of his heels is slowly decaying, and the spread of the disease is feared.

The newspaper, *Derniere Feure*, has begun the publication serially of the history of Colonel Henry I. Kowalsky's campaign in America in 1905-6 to counteract the effect of the exposure of atrocities in the Congo and to place in as favorable a light as possible King Leopold's Congo administration. The articles accuse Colonel Kowalsky of manipulating certain newspapers to deceive President Roosevelt and to block the action of Congress until the passage of the Lodge resolution.

Baron Manchour, the Belgian minister at Washington; James C. Whitley, consul-general of the Congo Independent state at Washington; Professor Alfred Nerinx and Henry W. Wack are represented as having been for a time closely allied with Colonel Kowalsky. Most of the documents printed thus far already have been published in the United States, but later an interesting sequel by Colonel Kowalsky is promised.

THREE ARE KILLED.

Passenger and Freight Trains Collide in Iowa.

Dubuque, Ia., Jan. 7.—In a collision between a Great Western railway freight train bound for Chicago and a north-bound Burlington passenger train here Sunday night, three persons were killed.

The dead are John Blanchard, engineer, La. Crosse, Wis.; Winfield McGaskey, trafaman, East Dubuque, and W. H. Smith, brakeman, Chicago.
