Randolph, Jan. 25.—An occasion of unusual interest was celebrated on yesterday afternoon and last evening in the little village of East Braintree, about five miles from Randolph, when Mr. and Mrs. A. K. McIntire observed their wedding anniversary, which was solemnized fifty years ago.

The entire time was passed very pleasantly in social intercourse and as the departing guests took leave of their host and hostess many useful and valuable presents were left behind to testify to the regard in which they were held.

Asa Kimball McIntire was born in Braintree, N. H., May 16, 1835, and when four years of age his parents moved to Braintree, and in this vicinity his life has been passed, except two years spent in the West.

From that time their home has been in Randolph, where Mr. McIntire was employed at what is now known as W. W. Bean's carriage shop for many years.

Mr. McIntire was early engaged in different employments, but later years have been devoted to blacksmith and like employments, his ingenuity and industry carrying success in almost anything he undertook.
