

10,000 SLAIN IN BATTLE

Fearful Slaughter of Moors by French Troops

SURROUNDED ASIATICS

And Mow'd Them Down with Their Machine Guns—The French Loss Is Reported as Trifling.

Tangier, Feb. 5.—Dispatches from the interior state that 10,000 Moors have been slain in a battle with the French forces.

This battle took place at Sattat, one of the Moorish strongholds.

According to the latest dispatches, the French led the attack and almost completely surrounded the Moors.

The attack was made from three sides with the French artillery in front, flanked by cavalry.

The total forces of the Moors is not stated. It is believed they numbered upward of 25,000.

The French moved them down whole ranks at a time as they charged, until the ground was literally heaped with the dead, dying and wounded.

The French were not badly shattered, is following up its victory and cutting down the fleeing Moors as fast as they can be overtaken.

BRINGS \$200,000 SUIT AGAINST PILLSBURY. G. F. Willey Bases Claims on Alleged Agreement of Explore Mine Property, at Nome, Alaska.

Manchester, N. H., Feb. 5.—George Franklin Willey brought suit yesterday for \$200,000 against Pillsbury, W. Pillsbury, based on an alleged agreement which Willey claims Pillsbury made with him, that he (Pillsbury) would explore the property of the Universal Gold Mine company at Nome, Alaska. Papers have been served on Pillsbury.

Mr. Pillsbury is a prominent figure in New Hampshire politics, and was a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor in the last campaign and is to be a candidate in the next.

Mr. Willey and the Universal Gold Mine company as plaintiff also brought suit for \$50,000 against Howard W. Ames, which is also connected with the operations of the company. Mr. Ames is a civil engineer at Nome, but is now in Manchester. Papers were served upon him yesterday.
