Report of the Overseer, A. E. Covell, Shows Net Cost to Have Been \$425.60.

Berlin, Feb. 12--The total amount expended for the support of the poor for the year ending February 15, 1908, was \$540.00, received from other towns, \$114.00; net cost to the town, \$426.00. At the time this report was made to the auditors, there was only one person receiving aid from the town.

The town is expecting to face something of a debt when the reports are all in, as there have been several unusual items of expense during the past year, chief among them being the epidemic of small pox, during which about 40 cases were reported in and about West Berlin early last summer.

Another item of expense which the town is glad to meet is its share in an under-pass which the Central Vermont railway has built near "Brown's mills." The new law relating to guide-boards has also been complied with by the selectmen at considerable expense.

ENGINEER ACQUITTED

On Charge of Manslaughter in Death of His Brakeman.

Worcester, Mass., Feb. 12--Engineer George H. Allen of Westboro, tried on the charge of manslaughter on account of the death of his brakeman, Charles E.
