GREAT SALE OF FURS.
Which Had Been Smuggled Across The Border.

Burlington, Feb. 26.—The sale of furs at the county court house yesterday afternoon, under the direction of United States Marshal Horace W. Bailey, attracted a crowd of men and women which completely filled the court room. The furs sold were those seized by the customs authorities at Alburgh last October. They were appraised at from \$1,500 to \$1,800. The total receipts of yesterday's sale were \$1,366.25. Deputy United States Marshal Thomas Reeves acted as auctioneer. The smuggled furs were on exhibition from ten o'clock yesterday morning until the time of the sale in the afternoon at two o'clock. The bidding was at times spirited.
