CITY HALL PROJECT SUFFERS.

Montpelier Citizens Voted Yesterday to Postpone Action. Montpelier voted yesterday to postpone until after the next session of the legislature any attempt to float bonds for a new city hall, and not to break ground for the building until after that time which practically postponed action for a year. The city appropriated \$3,000 for the support of Heaton hospital, \$1,000 for open air concerts by the Montpelier Military band, all needed expenses of Brooks Post, G. A. R., for Memorial day. The new granite plants of Brault & Sargent, H. J. Bertoli and the J. Poulin Granite company were exempted from taxation for a period of five years. Mayor Frank R. Dawley was elected without opposition and at once took his oath of office. His first official act was to re-appoint John S. W. Durkee chief of police. The other officers were also elected as stated yesterday. The aldermen elected for two years were: Ward 4, George D. Butler; ward 5, Frank E. Smith, James H. Kelleher, H. J. M. Jones, and Dr. P. L. Templeton were elected school commissioners for two years and Frank K. Goss for one year. S. W. Curran was elected park commissioner for five years. Jeremiah Dealy, who filed nomination papers for alderman in ward 6, won out by 101 votes against 84 cast for Johann Ruscher, the caucus nominee. The tax voted was 150 cents on a dollar of the grand list.

STRINGENT ORDER TO HUNT ANARCHISTS.

Secretary of Commerce and Labor Instructs Immigration Inspectors to Report Suspected People. Washington, D. C., March 4.—The secretary of commerce and labor yesterday issued a stringent order to all commissioners of immigration and immigrant inspectors in charge, directing them to confer with the police in their respective jurisdictions with a view to securing the co-operation of the police and detective forces in an effort to rid the country of alien anarchists and criminals falling within the law relating to deportation. As a caution in the application of his order, Secretary Straus says: "In order that any particular anarchist or criminal may be deported, evidence must be furnished showing that the person in question is an alien, subject to the immigration act; that he is an anarchist or criminal as defined in the statute; the date of his arrival in the United States, which must be within three years of the date of his arrest; the name of the vessel or the transportation line by which he came, if possible, and the name of the country whence he came; the details with respect to the last three items being kept at the various ports of entry in such a manner as to be available if information is furnished with respect to the anarchist's name, the date of his arrival and the port of entry. It is desired that the indicated steps shall be taken at once and that no proper effort shall be spared to secure and retain the co-operation of local police and detective forces in an effort to rid the country of alien anarchists and criminals falling within the provisions of the statute relating to deportation."
