### MAKING MARKED PROGRESS.

Panama Canal Dig Well, Reported By Capt. Kutz. New York, March 16.—Marked progress in the construction of the Panama canal is reported by Capt. F. W. Kutz, U. S. A., instructor in engineering at West Point Military academy, who returned yesterday on the steamship Panama after a 30-day's inspection of the new waterway. Speaking of his trip, Captain Kutz said: "The work seems to me to be progressing wonderfully. During 24 days of last month 300,000 cubic yards of earth were removed. Everyone appears to be happy and contented and the faithfulness and foresight of the future has disappeared. I believe the canal will be completed by July 3, 1915. That is the belief of General Goethals, who is chairman of the Isthmian canal commission. Captain Kutz advocated an army canteen as a solution of the liquor problem on the Isthmus, where he said the licensed saloons were practically controlled by Chinese who sold inferior liquor."

### VENEERING.

It is Produced by Two Methods, Sawing and Slicing. "There are two kinds of veneering—sawed and sliced—but it takes an expert to tell the difference," says a manufacturer. "The process of manufacture is simple and interesting. The logs, delivered at the factory in the rough, about thirteen feet in length, are first cooked in hot water vats to make them soft and workable. "It does not matter how green they are. After being thoroughly cooked they are placed on machines designed for the purpose and either sliced by a powerful knife the length of the log or cut by a circular saw into slabs about one-twentieth of an inch thick. "These slabs are the full length of the log and when first cut are so pliable that they can be bent double without breaking. The uniform thickness or thinness of the slabs is preserved by the action of the machinery and does not vary so much as a hair's breadth in the entire length of the slab. "After the slabs are sliced or sawed they are seasoned by steaming. This requires only about twenty-four hours, and then they are ready for the market. Some of the huge oak logs that come to the factory show by the rings in them that the trees were from 200 to 400 years old."—Washington Herald.

### Tomato Toast.

Cook down till thick half a can of tomatoes, with a pinch of cloves, half a teaspoonful of salt, a dash of cayenne, half an onion, minced fine, and a teaspoonful of minced parsley; have ready buttered toast without crust and pour this over without straining.—Harper's Bazar.

John Murphy Was Just Out of The Woodstock Jail, Too. Randolph, March 16.—D. D. Ke'ham, chief of police sought a night's lodging and supper. He gave as a reason for his present condition, want of work and a vain attempt to find any. He gave his age as 74 years and said he had no home.

### ON NOVEL CHARGE.

William Hill Arrested For Careless Distribution of Medicine Samples. Burlington, March 16.—William Hill was arrested Saturday and will be given a hearing in city court this morning on the charge of carelessly distributing samples of medicine. He was admitted to bail Saturday and furnished the necessary \$200. This prosecution is novel in that it is the first one made locally under an act of the legislature of 1906 which prohibits the distribution of medicine, drug or chemical compounds by leaving them on sidewalks, doorways or in any way so that will fall into the hands of children. The minimum fine is \$100 and costs with a maximum of \$300.

### TRIBUTE TO SENATOR PROCTOR.

Rutland, March 16.—Twelve hundred people gathered here last night at a memorial service arranged by citizens, irrespective of creed, in honor of United States Senator Redfield Proctor.
