DR. TUCKER REMAINS. Dartmouth College Trustees Have President's Promise. Hazeover, N. H., April 22.--E. M. Hopkins, secretary of Dartmouth college, gave out yesterday to the Dartmouth following memorandum of the Dartmouth college trustees' meeting held in Concord, N. H., April 17 and 18. The committee on the succession to the presidency, after a conference with Pres. Tucker in regard to the possibility of his carrying over the work into next year, made the following statement: "The committee do not expect to take action up on the question of Dr. Tucker's successor in the presidency of the college until sometime during the next college year. Dr. Tucker's health is now such that he can and will remain in general charge of the college for the present with the understanding that he is to be relieved of all outside engagements. The trustees are enabled, by this arrangement, to carry out certain plans which were interrupted by Dr. Tucker's protracted illness."
