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TO INCREASE G. A. R. ROLL. Efforts Being Made by Department Commander Beach.

Burlington, May 29.—Department Commander C. E. Beach has recently issued a circular letter from the headquarters of Department of Vermont, G. A. R., to special aides, recruiting officers, post commanders and adjutants, calling attention to the special effort which will be made in the state during the year 1908-9 to reach every comrade who is not a member of some post. The work will be accomplished by a systematically arranged method of recruiting the Grand Army of the Republic.

The board of assessors of St. Albans submit the following statement of their work this year: Polls, \$1,559; real estate, \$2,570,175; personal estate, \$782,653. This gives a grand total of \$36,688.28 less exemption of \$120.00, or \$36,568.28, which is much better than had been expected.

Burglars at Brattleboro Make Bold Break. Brattleboro, June 1.—The North street house of Wilfred H. Brackett, cashier of the People's national bank, was ransacked by burglars before daylight Saturday morning and \$90 was taken from Mr. Brackett's trousers, which he had left in the bathroom on the second floor. The burglary was discovered when the family awoke about 7 o'clock on Friday night and the burglars reached through the opening and operated the spring so that the upper sash was let down. Then they opened wide the side door and fastened open a swing door between the door leading to the room occupied by the servant girl, Mattie Larson, by stuffing matches over the latch and then proceeded to go through the house. They entered every room except the bedrooms, leaving burnt matches and candle drippings all over the house.

THE MONEY IN MR. BRACKETT'S TROUSERS was in a pocketbook, but that was left, as it bore Mr. Brackett's name. The butler's pantry was opened but no silver was taken, as it was all marked. A small amount of money was taken from a purse which Mrs. Brackett left on the front hall table. The burglars took from the pantry all the coffee, tea and food, also a considerable amount of food. All the contents in the house were up, which made the burglary all the more daring. Mr. Brackett was awake until midnight.

There is no doubt that all books kept for a long time in libraries and other places become the abode of the germ and microbe. To prevent this a French professor has introduced a method of disinfecting the books. They are placed in an oven under pressure, in which the evaporation of a certain liquid causes the breaking up of the aldehydes. It is said that all sorts of books, big and little, can thus be disinfected without harm to the cover, the paper or the binding.

An imperial decree issued by the Chinese government points out the evils of opium, and states that the British government has agreed to decrease its exportation for a trial period of three years in order to see whether the cultivation of the poppy and the number of opium smokers is lessened. Should such be the case, importation into China will be further decreased gradually. The decree orders the enforcement of existing regulations and the elaboration of further measures to deal with the evil.

ized the raising of 10 companies of riflemen, to be enlisted for one year. This was a vast improvement over the militia, but the term of enlistment was too short. The enthusiasm at this time was great, and recruiting was easy. H. Congress had voted 50,000 for three years, and to the end of the war, the response would doubtless have been immediate, and the Revolution, instead of dragging on for eight years and costing \$370,000,000, would probably have lasted eight months and cost one-tenth of that amount.—Army and Navy Life.
