

Household Hints.

If feather pillows have an unpleasant odor, give them a thorough drying before a clear fire.
Oil cans should be kept tightly corked as kerosene exposed to the air will not burn brightly and will form a crust on the wick shortly after being lighted.
Never place a good piece of furniture very near a fireplace or register. The heat dries the wood and glue, often causing rot where the parts are joined together.
When thin tumbler sticks together and there is danger of breaking them do not try to pull them apart, but put them into a pan of warm suds. In a short time they can be easily separated.
Be careful when you light a fire in the kitchen that there is plenty of water in the boiler. Otherwise when the cold water rushes in the hot boiler it is likely to crack it.
