Child Tailors in New York.
Miss Mary Van Kleeck, who, with several other young women, recently made an investigation of some typical blocks of New York tenement houses, not picked out because they were especially bad, found 538 child workers, of whom 406 were girls and 152 boys, all under sixteen years of age. One was only three years old, 3 were aged four, 21 aged five, 23 aged six, 44 aged seven, 45 aged ten, 62 aged eleven, 90 aged twelve, 70 aged thirteen, 46 from fourteen to sixteen. Of the whole number 491 were attending school, but working at home after school hours. Twenty-three were under age—too young even for a kindergarten, but old enough to work.
