ABOUT THE STATE. HAND DENIES THE STORY ABOUT JEROME. Has Not Recommended Dismissal of the Charges Against the New York District Attorney, As Was Reported.

Plattsburgh, N. Y., June 12.—Commissioner Richard L. Hand of Elizabethtown, N. Y., who was designated by Governor Hughes to investigate the charges against District Attorney William Jerome was told over the telephone of the story published in New York that his decision had been reached and that it was understood that while he criticized some acts of Jerome, Mr. Hand had found that the facts did not warrant removal. The story went on to state that Mr. Hand had recommended the dismissal of the charges. In denying this report as a "naked falsehood" Commissioner Hand said: "The story is absolutely without foundation. There are some 3,000 typewritten pages of evidence to go over, and I have just commenced the work of reviewing it. The time for filing supplementary briefs expired last night. As yet I have received neither Mr. Jerome's nor Mr. Pierce's supplemental brief. I expect to receive them to-day. Furthermore, I have read in the papers that new charges have been filed with Gov. Hughes and that Gov. Hughes has given Mr. Jerome until June 16 to make reply, and Gov. Hughes is quoted as saying that he will send along these new charges together with Mr. Jerome's reply to be taken up by me."

"I have received no official information in regard to these later charges, but I assume that the newspaper reports are correct, and that they will all go into my grist with the other charges. 'I have reached no decision in the matter. When the evidence and all the arguments are finally before me, I will come to a decision in the matter and make my report privately to Gov. Hughes.' Hearst's Total Gain Now 218. New York, June 12.—The recount in the Hearst-McClellan majority contest proceeded expeditiously yesterday. Seventy-four boxes counted up to noon to-day gave Hearst a net gain of thirty. Of the 464 boxes counted, Hearst's net gain is 218 votes. There are 1,484 boxes yet to be counted.

MANILA TO SPEND \$200,000 ON THE FLEET. Assembly Will Be Asked to Give Half That Sum for the Reception of the Battleships.

Manila, June 12.—A committee has started enthusiastically to raise a fund for the entertainment of Admiral Sperry's fleet when it reaches 'his port. It is intended to make Manila's demonstration in the greatest, the fleet has had. Building have already been erected and will be reconstructed to accommodate visiting sailors over night in the city. The plans contemplate the raising of a fund of \$200,000, which will be used to pay the expenses of the reception. All classes of citizens, Americans, Filipinos and the foreign population, are taking interest in the work. An assembly will be asked to appropriate \$100,000 from the government funds, and Governor General Smith has promised to recommend the appropriation in a special message.
