**Obesity Defined.**  
The very interesting history of a woman and the religion she established which has been running through McClure's for the past year, comes to an end in the June number, and will soon appear in book form. This article is culled from Christian Science literature.  
"A sensationless body," Mrs. Eddy says, is the ultimate hope of Christian Science. Since inaccessibility to pain is the ultimate good which her system of philosophy offers, it is natural that she should often point us to the lower forms of animal life for our exemplars. "Obesity," Mrs. Eddy says, "is an adipose belief of yourself as a substance. Leaving physiology and entering the field of philosophy Mrs. Eddy teaches: The history of Adam is allegorical throughout, a description of error and its results, etc. Man was created in God's likeness, free from sin, sickness, and death; but this Adam, who, "trig in 1's," Eddy does not explain how, was the origin of our belief that there is life in matter and to obstruct our growth in spirituality. Mrs. Eddy says, "I divide the name of Adam into two syllables, and it reads, a dam, or obstruction." This original method of word-analysis she seems to regard as final evidence concerning Adam. About the creation of Eve, Mrs. Eddy changes her mind. In the later edition of her book she says it is absurd to believe that God ever put Adam into a hypnotic sleep and performed a "surgical operation" upon him. In the first edition she says it is a mere chance that the human race is not still propagated by the removal of man's ribs. "The belief regarding the origin of mortal man has changed since Adam produced Eve, and the only reason a rib is not the present mode of evolution is because of this change, etc."

**ITS MISSION IS RIGHTEOUS.**

Taking into consideration all that organized workmen have striven for and attained in the past and all that we hope to do in the future, trades unionism is going to live and continue its fighting, no matter how mighty its earthly foes may be, for its mission is a righteous one, and its work will never end until poverty and the unhappiness it brings cease to exist. Is there not enough and to spare for all in this world? Yes. Then why should they who toil year in and year out continue a "hand to mouth" existence while the foulest and greatest gambling hell which has its abode in Wall street is allowed to gather up the fullness of the land and the accendres who control its blighting machinery revel in the millions they have wrung from the life giving streams of the nation, carrying woe to industry and idleness and suffering to the toiler? Why, we ask, should this Wall street gambling monster be permitted at its own wicked pleasure to toy and play with the financial and industrial welfare of the nation while the robbers gamble and fight among themselves as to who shall have the controlling interest in the wealth that has been siphoned from the people? Is there any earthly reason for its existence? If so, we have failed to find it or learn of it. In our humble opinion, it is time that our American citizenship asserted itself and demanded for its public servants in no uncertain terms legislation that will annihilate every vestige of the blight that this den of thieves has periodically cast upon our beloved country.  
These and other gamblers of high finance are responsible for the panicky conditions of today. Its holdings are now 2,400,000,000 tons, and its promoters say that they cannot be exhausted in a hundred years, while at the same time it has secured 2,000,000,000 tons of coal properties from its rival, the Tennessee Coal and Iron company, which is now no more.  
In his "saving the country" process and charitable work, we are told, J. Pierpont Morgan also crushed out of existence the Heintz Copper company and placed all its properties in the hands of H. H. Rogers and William Rockefeller or the Amalgamated Copper company, the biggest monopoly of its kind in the world, and this queering by the big capitalists of finance will go on and on until they get what they want, no matter whether the wheels of honest industry hum or not or whether thousands of honest working men and women walk the streets in idleness and in want of bread.  
Trades unionism any more than the president of the United States is not responsible, wholly or in part, for the depression, mistrust and want of confidence that confront a prosperous country. Organized labor may suffer with the rest of the people before a better condition is secured, but it will stand firmly in its purposes just the same, and the day is approaching when labor in its fullest meaning will come into its own.—Breckinryer and Mason.
