GRATITUDE.

What is this which we hear? Can it be possible that the Central Vermont railroad, in constructing a passenger station for Barre, has gone to Hardwick or Bethel for the granite trimmings to be used in the structure? Does the Central Vermont railroad overlook the fact that Barre produces a granite which in every way fills the bill? It so seems, judging by the statement from the office of the Woodbury Granite company of Hardwick and Bethel that the contract has been awarded to that concern; which does look like "shipping coals to Newcastle or scissors to Manchester," with a vengeance.

Let the officials of the Central Vermont consider the significance of such a contract. For thirty years their road has been shipping millions of tons of granite out of Barre and the road has been kept out of the poor house largely through the tremendous receipts thereby secured. Its own figures show the very great lift which the Barre Branch has given toward paying the expenses of the corporation—more accordingly than any other branch line or any considerable portion of the main line from St. Albans to New London. Furthermore, the business is increasing every day of every year; and more gold is pouring into the coffers of the Central Vermont railroad than it ever dreamed of securing before the Barre granite section was opened up and the industry developed to the advantage of the transportation companies. Begged and beseeched to run its line to Barre, the Central Vermont finally did plant a trail up the valley from Montpelier Junction, and is, therefore, one of the great beneficiaries of Barre's thrift. It simply fell into a fortune, the gift of Barre.

Now, the state board of railroad commissioners having seen the shameful way Barre is treated in the way of railroad facilities and having forced the Central Vermont railroad to erect a passenger station, decent if not entirely satisfactory in other ways, the Central Vermont railroad with splendid gratitude to Barre for thirty years' assistance in keeping the wolf from the door, goes to Hardwick for the granite to be used in the trimmings of the building. Gratitude, did you say? Even the stone of the Barre hillside could respond as feelingly and as manfully as the Central Vermont railroad is doing. It isn't the monetary value of such a trifling contract that makes Barre groan, but the utter lack of appreciation, thus displayed, for the splendid support which Barre has given to the Central Vermont railroad. We should like to know the real motive back of the betrayal.

THE NEW PARTY NOMINEES.

The introduction of another national party into Vermont politics, which event was signalized by the nomination of a state ticket of the Independence League at Rutland last night, will have little or no effect on the political complexion of the state, at least for many years to come. For the present, people look upon the Independence League as a pri-

vate organ for the aggrandizement of William Randolph Hearst, and until such time as that idea shall have been driven from the popular estimation the Independence League can hope for merely indifferent success either in Vermont or in national politics. It is possible that political parties may take a different

alignment before long, but the defection must come from a concerted desire, not a one-man ambition.
