**A POOR SAMPLE OF VERMONT ROADS.**

The Glidden automobile tourists who passed through Vermont yesterday on their way from Maine to New York on the annual summer run, struck some real mountain climbing when they crossed the Green Mountain Ridge from Woodstock to Rutland, and they reported on reaching the latter place that the going was the hardest they had struck during their entire trip. We trust that the Glidden tourists will not carry away with them the idea, gained from that experience, that Vermont roads in general are poor and, spreading the report, serve to drive away much of the summer business that is being attracted to this section. As a matter of fact, they saw the worst stretch of Vermont roads when they went over the mountain at Woodstock, which is a portion rarely covered by automobilists and which was, undoubtedly, selected for the Glidden itinerary by reason of the fact that it was the shortest cut across the state. That mountain climb is not even a fair sample by which to judge of Vermont roads, and it is unfortunate for the state's reputation for good roads that this course should have been selected. The spirit of progress has so far taken possession of the state that her people are anxious that a reputation for shill-less care of the highways should not be fastened upon them. The Woodstock-Rutland trip, although interesting from a scenic standpoint, is one of our least valuable assets when it comes to consideration of the roads.

**SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.**

Merrill Audette, a State Prisoner, Ordered Released.

The judges of the Supreme court, who have been in conference for three days, have handed down some important decisions which were filed with the clerk of the court this morning. They include the Brock malpractice case, release of Merrill Audette, a state prisoner, and others. They are: Washington county, Emily K. Wood vs. Bertram A. Hunt, pro forma decree affirmed and case remanded; Davis & Farnham vs. A. K. Dunbar & Co., and People's Lighting, Heating and Power company, trustee, judgment affirmed. In the lower court the damages were given the plaintiffs for \$10,074.51.

In the case of state vs. Merrill Audette of Windsor county, in which the respondent was adjudged guilty of adultery, on an agreed statement of facts, sentenced to state prison, mittimus issued, the exceptions were sustained, sentence vacated, judgment reversed, verdict set aside, and respondent discharged.

In the Rutland case of Charles Harrison vs. Will L. Davis, a petition for mandamus, the petition was dismissed with costs. This is the case where Treasurer Harrison sought to get the court to order the school directors to pay back money which they had received by drawing an order. He claimed that he was the only official who could pay out money on individual bills; this decision shows that the directors can draw an order for a lump sum of money and pay small bills with it.

In the case of W. A. Smith as collector of taxes vs. Mary A. Standard and trustee, heard on exceptions of defendant, the judgment was reversed and cause remanded.

In the case of John S. Wilkins administrator vs. W. W. Brock and L. K. Rosselle from Chittenden county, heard on defendant Brock's exceptions, and also on his petition for a new trial, the

judgment was reversed, petition dismissed with costs and cause remanded.

In the two cases of Willis R. Child et al vs. Hollis L. Shaw et al from Addison county, the decree in each case dismissing the bill with cost to defendant, was affirmed and cause remanded.

In the case of Sibil Harris vs. Bottom & Torrence in Bennington county, the judgment was reversed, cause remanded.

**BAIL WAS FURNISHED.**

In Case of State vs. Charles Tupper for Furnishing.

Bail was fixed yesterday in Montpelier city court in the case of state against Charles Tupper for furnishing. Tupper was arrested last Saturday for furnishing liquor to Jennie McMillan and waivered examination. He was bound over to county court. He was committed to jail until George R. Tupper of Bakersfield could come to satisfy the state with bail, which was fixed at \$400.
