LIVELY DAYS AT NEWPORT.

Police and Sheriffs Have Been Kept Busy This Week.

Newport, Aug. 6.—Police officers and deputies have been kept busy this week by lawbreakers. The first occurrence was Sunday afternoon when Chief of Police Hinman was called to quiet a row near Prouty & Miller's No. 2 mill between people who were trading horses. The men were under the influence of liquor and got into a dispute about the terms of trade. This led to blows and one of the parties used a barn shovel as a weapon which resulted in a black eye and a scalp wound.

The case looked so serious that Officer Hinman called State's Attorney Cook and in company with a doctor visited the scene of the fight and found the man was not hurt as seriously as at first supposed. The remainder of the party has left for parts unknown.

William Hyland came into town from Graniteville, P. Q., in an intoxicated condition, his horse showing signs of intolerable abuse. Hyland was picked up by Deputy Sheriff Hill. It was found that he had two very severe cuts on his right arm and was bleeding so freely that the wagon seat and his clothes were saturated with blood. A doctor was called and the wounds dressed. When asked as to how he had been hurt he replied that a dog had bitten him. This story the authorities would not accept as the wounds were made with some sharp instrument. Hyland will rest in jail until the case is looked into more thoroughly.

A young man, whose name cannot be learned, was taken into custody Tuesday and seemed to be in an unbalanced state of mind from answers to questions by the sheriff. When asked what his name was he replied that he did not know. He said he had a job somewhere and he was paid off and discharged but he does not know where it was or who he was working for. An examination was made by a physician who found that he was suffering from the effects of some drug, either chloral or morphine. He will be kept for a few days for observation.

INDICT THREE MEN.

They Are Charged With The Violation of Election Laws.

Plattsburgh, N. Y., Aug. 6.—The grand jury convened by Governor Hughes at the request of the Association to Prevent Corrupt Practices at elections, of which organization Seth Low is president, last night brought into court three indictments for violations of the election law.

Charles S. Whitman of New York, acting as deputy attorney-general is conducting the investigation. Surprise and satisfaction was expressed at the success of Judge Whitman in securing action by the grand jury thus early, the jury having been in session less than three days.

Both political parties are involved, and the prosecution states that it is ready to act impartially in prosecuting either Republicans or Democrats.
