PLANT LICE. A Prize Formula For Freeing Vegetation of the Pests. A government report states that the Practical Counselor For Fruit and Garden Culture of Frankfurt recently offered a prize for the best method of destroying plant lice, for which fifty-eight persons competed. The prize was awarded to the author of the following preparation: Quassa wood, two and one-half pounds, to be soaked over night in ten quarts of water and well boiled, then strained through a cloth and placed, with 100 quarts of water, in a petroleum barrel, with five pounds of soft soap. The mixture is then ready for sprinkling on plants infested with lice. Leaves, even those of peach trees, will not be injured in the least by the solution, which can be kept covered in the barrel from spring to fall without deterioration. As soon as lice appear the leaves should be sprinkled with the solution. If this is repeated several times the pests will disappear.

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ERIE. In Market Letter 22, published July 18, attention was called to Erie and as high a price as 75 was predicted for it eventually. In Market Letter 27, published August 22, was stated: "The showing which Erie will make during the next few months will surprise even its English stockholders. The advance in the price of common stock will also be a surprise to them." The recent strength and activity of Erie is only the beginning of the move. The stock is recognized today as a Harriman issue and under the same speculative influences which control the price movements in Southern Pacific and Union Pacific, the stock should be one of the most attractive for trading on the New York list. Erie has the advantage of being low enough in price to admit of its being carried on relatively small margins with safety and for this reason alone, it should be inviting to the stock trader. Before the present move is over, the stock ought to sell at least as high as \$30, per share, and if the bull market which we expect, develops during the winter, the price predicted six weeks ago would not look high for it. SHORT STORIES. A new scale not only weighs, but also counts the articles being weighed, provided they are all alike. There are men in Oklahoma thirty-five years of age who will have their first chance to vote for president this year. While the tonnage of the fleet of the great lakes is increasing, the number of craft is decreasing owing to the greater capacity of the newer boats. The population of Fairbanks, Alaska, is over 80 per cent men, and it is said that there is a great demand for women who wish to be married there. Systematic investigation of the Philippine Islands reveals the fact that the group consists of 2,900 islands, while before the American occupation the number was estimated at 1,200. The department of the interior is planning to reclaim enough sterile land and swamps to form a stretch sixty miles wide from New York to San Francisco and capable of sustaining 100,000,000 persons. Four little Angora goats drawing a small conveyance and their master are making a trip across the American continent from San Diego, Cal., to New York. The goats travel on an average fifteen miles a day.

Home Notes. The harder the toothbrush the more effectually it cleans the teeth. Newspapers may be used to pad the ironing board just as well as an old blanket or muslin. Slight stains can be removed from black cloth by rubbing with a freshly cut raw potato, wiping with a clean cloth. To mend hemstitching cover the space of the worn hemstitching with insertion and stitch both edges on to tray cloth, and it will then be as good as new and even prettier. Use a clean brick to stand the iron on when ironing instead of the usual ironing stand. It has no holes underneath to admit the air, and the irons will retain their heat much longer. Soap and powdered chalk mixed and rubbed on mildew spots will remove them. To expedite matters let the spotted article lie in the sun for a few hours, damping it again as it dries.

Church Work. Protestants of all denominations at Boston have united for a great missionary exhibition next summer to be coincident with the one in London. The Southern Presbyterian church, which has jurisdiction from Baltimore to New Orleans, last year collected and used about \$350,000 in the foreign field. It costs the Methodist Episcopal church about \$28,000,000 annually for its preaching and superintendence, this including about \$900,000 that is paid to supernumerary ministers. It costs upward of \$200,000 for triennial change of pastors in the Wesleyan church of England, when some 700 preachers, or about one-third of the whole number, take up new charges. Arrangements have already been made with Dr. G. Campbell Morgan of London to visit New York for ten days during Lent of next year to assist other famous preachers in a Bible institute.

He found the number to be 8,769,000, which gives 23,740 steps a day. A horse at Atlantic Highlands, N. J., having been hit by an automobile going sixty miles an hour and a little later by a railroad train, was rescued uninjured, swimming in the Shrewsbury river.

English Etchings. It is proposed to paint the gun ports of the Victory yellow, their color at Trafalgar, and to re-rig the ship as she was in Nelson's time. Organ builders of old built to good purpose, as the one in Allhallows church, Harking, England, shows, it having been installed in 1677. It is now undergoing only its second renovation. The historic Great Queen Street chapel, or, as it is better known, Kingsway hall, in London, has been declared unsafe for further use, which will be a hard blow for the Methodists, but they will at once try to raise \$125,000 with which to rebuild.

"Com," owned by A. B. Comstock of Burlington, won first money in the 2:16 race in connection with his race at the Plattsburgh, N. Y., fair Thursday. In the same race "Dolly C.," owned by Luke Livingston of South Hero, was drawn. In the three-minute trot class, "Overlake," from the Vermont Stock farm, Shelburne, won third money.

PLANNING REVIVAL FOR VERMONTERS. Dr. J. W. Chapman to Begin Campaign in the State During November. Burlington, Sept. 4.—The evangelical churches of Vermont are planning a big revival for the pre-holiday season, which it is anticipated will awaken a deeper religious spirit throughout the state. An organization has been perfected comprised of representatives from the several denominational bodies interested in the movement, and the details of the campaign are already being arranged. The Rev. Dr. J. Wilbur Chapman is the evangelist coming. He will spend the greater part of November following the presidential election, in Vermont. Before his coming, local pastors will have organized the field and awakened interest by conducting special services in the outlying districts and advertising the fact that Chapman is coming. The revivalist will divide the state into two sections, north and south. He will spend two weeks in one and about the same time in the other, holding meetings in the larger community centers, such as Burlington, St. Albans, Montpelier, Rutland and Bennington. The organization officers are as follows: President, Major-General O. O. Howard, Burlington; secretary, The Rev. W. E. Brantley, Barre; and a long list of vice-presidents including ministers and laymen from every section of the state.

STORY CAUSES ARREST. Cottagers Read of Boys Using Rifle and Solve Mystery. Bellows Falls, Sept. 14.—As a sequel to the "William Tell shooting incident" in Rockingham, upper middle town, two Bartlett boys of this place were arrested Friday night charged with breaking entering and grand larceny. The arrests were made as the sequel of the shooting as reported in the Globe. Messrs. Spaulding and Guild on reading the story revealed they had lost some rifles among other things from their cottages which had recently been broken into. They came to Bellows Falls and secured search warrants and had the premises occupied by the Bartlett's searched and found two phonographs, three guns, five phonograph records, lanterns and much other plunder, most of which has been identified by various cottagers as property stolen from their cottages. After an all-night session of the court, Felix Bartlett, aged 12, was sent to the reform school during his minority. Fred Bartlett, aged 18, was bound over to the county court for trial. About \$60 worth of property was recovered, some having been sold to local dealers.

SHELLEY AND ARCHER IN JAIL. Fair Haven Men Charged With Larceny From Parsons. Rutland, Sept. 14.—Charged with robbing William L. Parsons of Rutland of his watch and a small amount of cash at the Fair Haven fair, Harry Shelley and Harley Archer of that town were arraigned before Justice B. H. Stickey Saturday and bound over to the county court. They were remanded to jail in default of \$500 each. Parsons testified that Shelley and Archer invited him to have a drink of whiskey behind a tent, and that Shelley held him, putting one hand over his mouth, while Archer went through his pockets.

One Industry of the Peaky Ant. Out in Burma and the far east, where sandalwood is worth its weight in silver, the pestiferous ant is a valuable assistant to the loggers of that precious timber. The hard and fragrant heartwood alone has value, but as the tree grows this valuable heart is overlaid by a soft and worthless layer forming two-thirds of the trunk. When a tree is felled and cut into lengths the loggers let the timber lie. At once the ants begin work upon the soft wood, which is sappy and sweet enough to attract them. In a few weeks, less than a month in the case of the largest butts, the ants deliver the heartwood free of all the worthless sapwood.

Flannel. Flannel will not harden or shrink if, when new, it is put into clean cold water and left for a week, changing the water frequently. Wash well in warm water, using a little soap to remove the oil. Flannel thus washed never hardens.
