The stone sheds in the south end of the city were shut down to-day for lack of electric power, the manufacturers being notified by the electric company yesterday afternoon that the power would be shut off from the sheds in that section to-day.

The engine is of the single cylinder type, manufactured by Oils, and is a heavy piece of machinery. The complete engine weighs seven tons and the fly wheels alone weigh 54,000 pounds. The engine was installed by H. B. Kennedy, a representative of the Boston branch of the manufacturers.

The closing band concert of the season by the Montpelier Military Band on the city's appropriation of \$450 was given last evening at the city park stand and was declared to be one of the best of the season. The program included some of the old but favorite selections, the rendering of which attracted merited appreciation. 
