

NEITHER SIDE MADE SCORE

Coddard and St. Michael's on Foot Ball Gridiron

GODDARD WAS STRONGER

The Local Team Ought to Have Won Yesterday's Game With the Wisconsin College—Did Most of the Rushing.

In the opening game of the football season yesterday afternoon Goddard seminary played a no-score game with the St. Michael's college eleven of Wisconsin. Goddard started off making long gains almost at will and it looked as though she would score in the first few minutes of the game but her slowness in getting off their plays, costly fumbles and two poor attempts in the first half at making forward passes killed her chances for a victory.

After gaining but five yards in two more rushes Scampini made another forward pass which Alexander fumbled and St. Michael's got the ball. St. Michael's fumbled on the first rush but held the ball. The visitors failed to gain around their left end in the next rush and then punted 20 yards. Shinn caught the ball for Goddard and rushed it back five yards to the seminary's 45 yard line. Goddard then rushed the ball to within 15 yards of the goal, gaining 10 yards of the distance on penalties on the visitors for off sides, when time was up for the half.

The last half was practically a repetition of the first. Goddard kicked off to St. Michael's who, being unable to rush the ball with any success, tried the forward pass and made two gains of 20 yards each, but the third time Scampini received the pass and the ball went to Goddard on her own 20-yard line. Goddard then rushed the ball back to the center of the field where she lost it on downs for the first time in the game. After gaining 15 yards around right end St. Michael's made an on-side pass and punted 20 yards to Gardner. Goddard then rushed the ball as far as her 20 yard line when time was up.

The two teams were quite evenly matched in weight but Goddard showed the stronger in defensive work and her backs, Alexander, Gardner and Scampini did good work in carrying the ball. Owing to lateness in starting the game the time of the halves had to be cut down to 15 minutes so that the visitors would have time to catch the 5:45

train, and the short game worked against the Goddard team on account of her slowness in starting their plays. There was a fair sized crowd present. The gridiron was roped off and policed so that the crowd was kept entirely off the field, making the conditions much more satisfactory for the players and the spectators as well.

COLONY TO RIVAL THE FAMED BROOK FARM

It Will Be Composed of Women, Who Will Raise Fruit and Flowers Under Glass.

New York, Oct. 8.—If present plans materialize, Long Island will soon have a colony which in time bids fair to rival the famous Brook Farm colony of Massachusetts of Upton Sinclair's Helicon Hall. The location will be at Belleforest, near Northport, and the business of the colony, which is to consist entirely of women, will be to raise fruits and flowers under the influence of glass and electricity.

The promoter of the idea is Mrs. Davidson, a Russian-American, who has spent years of experimenting in order to determine its feasibility. "The idea which I am working on is not new. Sir Oliver Lodge has been making experiments along similar lines, though I was not aware of the fact until recently," she said. "The chief difference between my plan and Sir Oliver's is that in mine the fruits and flowers are grown under glass."

NECK AND NECK FOR PENNANT

New York Now Tied With Chicago for First Place

GIANTS BEAT BOSTON, 7 TO 2

New York, Oct. 8.—The New York Giants tied up the National league championship with Chicago by winning the third consecutive game with Boston yesterday afternoon by the score of 7 to 2. New York put Ames into the box to repeat his previous performance in this series, apparently intending to save Mathewson for the crucial game with the Cubs this afternoon. Boston went after Ames in the first inning as if to eat him up, scoring two runs on three hits. But they were the only runs that Boston could get, as Ames tightened up thereafter and held the Bean-eaters in the palm of his hand.

Three pitchers looked very much alike to the Giants. Flaherty retired in the middle of the fourth after New York had scored three runs on six hits. Matten substituted for Flaherty and finished the inning, but New York played hot with him, rapping out four hits which, on top of the two off Flaherty in the same inning totaled the Giants four runs. Chappelle finished the game for Boston and held the home team without scoring.

Boston's tallies came in the first inning this way: Becker beat out a slow grounder and Bates singled a single. Browne tried to sacrifice and fanned. Bresnahan had a little passed ball and the runners advanced a base. Then McGann swung against the ball for a triple over Seymour's head, sending in both Becker and Bates. Sweeney fouled out and McGann got pinched going to third on Dahlin's bunt, closing the inning and Boston's best chance to win the game.

In the second, Hannifan failed to stop Donlin's rap, but McGann collared Seymour's grounder and Devin fouled out. McCormick came up with a single and Donlin tallied New York's first run. Bridwell fouled out. Hits by Ames and Tenney, Herzog's out from Hannifan to McGann and Tenney's fast leg work over Bresnahan's grounder, gave the fast-moving Giants two runs in the next inning. The fourth put the game out of the way. Seymour and Devin opened with singles and then Flaherty was sent to the stable. When Matten mounted the mound McCormick singled and Bridwell hit for a single, scoring Seymour and putting Devin on third. Ames got in his second safe rap and Devin failed. Tenney laid down a pretty bunt and Herzog clouted a fine one to left, sending both Bridwell and Ames. Bresnahan rapped to Sweeney, who touched third and then threw to McGann, a double play. New York got but three scattered hits off Chappelle, who finished the game, but no more runs were needed, as Ames had Boston tied to the post. The score:

GOVERNMENT CROP REPORT.

Condition of Corn 77.8 Per Cent, as Compared With 79.4 Last Month.

Washington, Oct. 8.—The corn crop condition on October 1 was 77.8 per cent; spring wheat quality, 88.1 per cent; total production of spring wheat was indicated as 233,090,000, the yield per acre averaging 13.2 bushels; combined production of spring and winter wheat indicated as about 659,000,000 bushels of 89.4 per cent quality; oat crop quality was 81.3 per cent; the production being 789,161,000 bushels, with yield per acre averaging 24.9 bushels. These were the features of the department of agriculture report issued yesterday.

THE EUROPEAN SITUATION

Russia Upsets the Proposed Conference

IF THE TREATY IS REVISED

She Will Demand Compensation—Turkey Is Advised to Reach Other Settlement—Austria and Bulgaria Urged to Reconsider.

London, Oct. 8.—There is no disguising the fact that the European situation created by the changes in the Balkans suddenly has become tense. This does not mean that there will be war, but the conditions require delicate handling. Yesterday's developments were decidedly interesting. In the morning it was confidently asserted that there would be a European conference for the purpose of revising the Berlin treaty. All of the Powers were agreed to this. This afternoon the complexion of affairs have changed. Russia has upset the proposed conference by saying that in any revision of the treaty which originally aimed at her side would demand compensation. This has switched Great Britain to an about-face, and she has advised Turkey to settle the affair, if possible, without an appeal to Europe. Serbia is greatly excited over the annexation by Austria of Bosnia and Herzegovina. The populace is clamoring for war and the government listening to this, not only have addressed a protest to the Powers, but has called out about 200,000 reserves to meet any contingency that may arise. There are many Serbians in Bosnia and they do not want to become Austrian subjects, their aspirations being autonomy with Serbian protection. Economically Serbia is at the mercy of Austria and she has used her advantage hence the added hatred. But an appeal to arms might result in the obliteration of Serbia, for Bulgaria, who with Austria helps to hem her in would lean toward Austria. It is reasonable that the Powers will exert whatever influence they have to prevent Serbia being foolish. In this whole Balkan affair it again has been demonstrated that treaties and the rules of international law are not worth the paper they are written on when the interests of a strong nation are at stake. And the interests do not have to be vital either, as witness the case

THREE "WIDOWS" EACH SHARE IN \$1,000,000

Contest Over Joseph F. Greenough Will End Out of Court—Terms Not Made Public.

Boston, Oct. 8.—The contest of the will of the late Joseph F. Greenough, who died in 1906, and whose estate was claimed by three women, all purporting to be widows, has been settled out of court. The terms of the settlement are not made public, but it is believed each of the three women is to receive a portion of the estate left by Mr. Greenough, estimated at \$1,000,000.

Mr. Greenough died in 1906. Three women appeared as widows, the first, Martha Higgins, alleging that Greenough married her secretly; Emma Pomeroy, claiming to have been married to him after seeing divorce papers afterwards found to be fraudulent; and Mary Keefe, claiming that she had lived with Greenough under a common-law agreement, and that he later had married her.

25 OF CREW DROWNED.

Disaster to The Juanita on The Grand Banks.

St. Pierre, Miq., Oct. 8.—Twenty-five men were drowned as the result of the foundering of the French fishing schooner Juanita on the Grand Banks last week. The sole survivor, the captain of the vessel, who managed to cling to some planks for several hours, was rescued by another vessel and was brought here today. He has lost his reason. The disaster occurred during a heavy gale. The Juanita was a three-masted schooner and was owned in St. John, N. B., and registered 147 tons net, and was built at Liverpool, N. S., in 1897.
