THE LAW'S DELAY.
Vital Importance of This Neglected Issue—Some Dilatory Calendars.

In his Chicago Chamber of Commerce speech Mr. Taft said that the delays in the administration of justice and the "inequality between the poor and the rich" need reform more than any other existing wrong.

Mr. Taft is right in the vital importance which he attaches to this almost neglected issue. Delay in justice is in many cases equivalent to a denial of justice. Inequality in the administration of justice is worse than no administration, for legally sanctioned inequality is the worst justice.

This is even more a State issue than a national issue. The calendar in the State courts is more dilatory than in the national courts. The eighty-cent gas case, which began a little more than two years ago, appears today on the calendar of the supreme court of the United States. It took twice as long for the special franchise case, which originated in the State courts, to reach its final decision, and the litigation for its enforcement is still pending, with more than \$30,000,000 unpaid taxes, the accumulation of nine years, awaiting judicial enforcement.

In the County of New York the calendar of the supreme court has on it seven thousand cases, the accumulation of years. Had not plaintiffs died or their money exhausted through the law's delays the cases would be thousands more.

As Mr. Taft says, this system results "in the unequal burden which the delays and expenses of litigation impose on the poor litigants."

A rich man, a big corporation, a high financier, find no difficulty in paying their lawyers' bills and court costs, in taking successive appeals, in arguing dilatory motions, in prolonging trials and in clogging court calendars. When they have committed an act of injustice they rely on the law's delay as part of their assets in financial crimes.

This clogging of the wheels of justice is not confined to higher courts. The Court of Special Sessions, which hears misdemeanors and petty criminals, has 6000 cases on its calendar. The Court of general sessions has more than 1,000 cases of felony. In the municipal courts the litigation between tenants and their landlords, the small claims for goods sold and other matters, of utmost importance to the poor are also clogged.

In all of England there are fewer judges than New York County, and yet these English judges dispose of their calendars. Especially pressing in this State is the issue of the law's delay and the denial of justice.—New York World.

CENTRAL VERMONT'S REPORT.
Passenger Traffic Was Slightly Increased Last Year.

The annual report of the Central Vermont railroad shows gross receipts of \$3,740,760.39; operating expenses, \$2,932,608.62; taxes, \$107,521.02; net earnings, \$700,630.75; other income in securities held by the company, \$13,840; total income, \$714,470.75; interest on bonds and rental of leased lines, \$710,667.23; net surplus over fixed charges, \$3,552.99.

Receipts from all sources decreased \$92,328.10. Expenditures were divided; maintenance of ways and structures, increase \$4,491.42; maintenance of equipment, increase \$40,734.57; conducting transportation, decrease \$154,901.74; general expenses, increase \$217.94; total operating expenses, decrease \$108,554.50; net increase, \$4,227.05; fixed charges, increase, \$10,539.84; improvements included in operating expenses, decrease \$74,849.19.

The property, says the report, has been well maintained, and improvements to the extent of \$126,112.83 have been made during the year and included in operating expenses. Earnings from the freight traffic show a slight decrease compared with 1907, attributable to the general depression in business. This was partly offset by an increase in earnings from passenger traffic.

ABOUT THE STATE
Senator W. P. Dillingham was one of the speakers at a Republican rally at Manchester, N. H., Monday evening.

The Rev. Charles E. Gordon of East Providence, R. I., has accepted a call from the Congregational church in Derby to become its pastor. He will begin his work as soon as possible.

Shortly after daylight Tuesday trackmen found broken fish plates in a frog on the Rutland railroad where they had been placed with the evident intent to wreck one of the sleeper trains. Luckily the plates broke and the train sped on its way without anyone on board being the wiser for the narrow escape.

It is said that parties have been in Newport looking at the elevator at the International mill intending to use it to store part of the grain in transit which was to have been used at Richford. It is also reported that the flour sheds at Newport will be used as a storehouse by the same company.

Seining Cases Appealed.
The cases of State vs. Walter Hutchins, Amos Blair, and Fred Blair, all of Allburg, which were to have been heard Monday before Justice of the Peace Henry W. Conroy, of South Hero, charged with the illegal drawing of a seine the night of June 3, 1908, at Stevemans' point, on the extreme north end of North Hero Island, came to an abrupt ending. The parties appeared, waived examinations, and appealed to the January term of the Grand Isle county court, held being fixed at \$125 each, which was furnished by John Blair and V. A. Bullard of Burlington, appeared for the respondents, and H. W. Hubbard of Hyde Park, for the state.

Claremont Gets Power From Cavendish.
The current from the electric power plant, installed on the Black river in Cavendish, by the Claremont (N. H.) Railway, Power & Lighting Co., was turned on Monday afternoon. The plant is now practically completed and will send into Claremont 2,250 horse power when necessary.

The power was sent in from the Cavendish plant to run the railway lighting and mill power. The trial of the new plant did not pull down the water in the Black river to a noticeable degree, and the machinery worked to perfection.

The enterprise was one of great magnitude and afforded a problem in engineering, for tunnels, flumes and monster dams were necessary to complete the work, while what was once a meadow land is now a little lake.
