NOTES AND COMMENT ON LEGISLATURE

Senators W. A. Lord, M. D. Wells, and O. L. Eaton, Washington county members of the Senate of 1904, entertained the members of the 1904 reunion society at a banquet at the Montpelier house on Wednesday.

The House established a time-saving precedent on Wednesday afternoon when it refused to reconsider its vote of the day before refusing a third reading to the House bill relating to salaries of assistant judges but it did reconsider Mr. Bacon's bill empowering towns and cities and incorporated villages to appropriate money for agricultural fairs.

Indications last evening pointed to the election of Hon. Zed S. Stanton as superior judge this afternoon. The vacancy on the supreme bench made by the retirement of Judge J. M. Tyler will result in the election of Superior Judge Haselton to the supreme bench and Mr. Stanton will likely fill the vacancy on the superior bench.

Postmaster and Mrs. Collins Graves of Bennington were visitors at the State House on Wednesday. They were guests of Senator William P. Dillingham at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Paul S. Dillingham on Seminary hill.

The farmers meeting in the cloak room on Wednesday evening was about the most interesting occurrence at the State House this week. It was attended by 60 or 70 and a large part of those present spoke on the questions. Upon motion of Mr. Cook of Danby it was voted almost unanimously that an open season for deer of six days was about the right thing allowing doe as well as bucks to be shot.

In the Senate on Wednesday afternoon the bill allowing three persons to incorporate under the laws of the state instead of requiring five subscribers was passed and the bill providing for the imprisonment in county jails for misdemeanors calling for a sentence of 100 days or less was ordered to its third reading.

As forecasted in Wednesday's Times Governor Prouty late yesterday afternoon issued a proclamation postponing the open season for killing of deer to November 8. The season would have opened next Monday.
