Successful Presentation of a Domestic Tragedy Play.  
Henri Bernstein's play, "The Thief," was presented by a Charles Frohman company of seven people at the Barre opera house last night. It is a tragedy of the family, in which a once unsuspecting love between husband and wife is embittered by the foolish efforts of the young wife to retain the affections of her husband by the wiles of splendid raiment. So thoroughly imbued is the young wife with the conviction that she must dress exquisitely for this purpose that she goes beyond her means and then steals some twenty thousand odd francs (the play is French) from her own husband.  
Meanwhile the nineteen years old son of the household become infatuated with the young wife, who spurns his love but uses the youth as a scapegoat when the robbery is uncovered. To save the young wife from disgrace, the youth confesses to the theft and is punished by the father by being sent to far away Brazil. But just as he is about to start, the young wife makes an abject confession. Her husband, already torn by her confession of guilt in the robbery case, becomes enraged over his suspicion of her infidelity. The denouement is the happy reuniting of husband and wife in mutual trustfulness.  
Clifford Bruce plays the part of the husband and does it easily and in a finished manner. The leading lady's role is after the fashion of those which Mrs. Leslie Carter is best fitted to storm about in, but Marie Hopps summons the necessary spirit in the apit-out parts and is all to the good in the loving scenes. Stephen Cornelius plays the part of the father in a grand manner, while Charles Walton make a good loverly youth. Mrs. Hilary Bell as step-mother of the youth and with a little influence as step-mothers usually have, Frank E. Herborn as a gentleman detective and Joseph Allenton as a servant, complete a satisfactory cast.
