

**Elect by Plurality Votes.**

Our representative, Allan Calhoun, Sr., has for his oldest son, Allan T., as loyal a Democrat as has been raised hereabouts. He cast his first vote with that party in 1896, and has been doing the same stunt as manytimes as the authorities would allow ever since, being the present able chairman of the local town committee. Though the House of Calhoun, politically, it divided against itself, it seems in no imminent danger of falling yet awhile.--Middlebury Register.

**Sprouted Grain For Poultry.**

The use of sprouted grain in feeding poultry has been finding many advocates of late. The process is a simple one, and may be easily experimented with by the amateur with only a small stock. It is well known, of course, that when wheat, oats or barley are soaked in water they increase materially in bulk. If, after being soaked for twenty-four hours, they are put in a warm place and kept damp, they will throw out long sprouts, in which condition they prove very palatable to fowls.

An easy way to sprout the grain is to place it in a barrel and thoroughly wet it. It should be kept in a rather warm place and in a damp condition for some time, but should be stirred every day,--there will be no danger of its becoming moldy or oversteamed.--Suburban Life for November.
