

14th Annual Session Is Being Held in Montpelier.

The 14th annual meeting of the Vermont State Horticultural society opened yesterday afternoon in Armory hall at Montpelier. T. L. Kinney of South Hero, the president, presided. The meetings will continue through Friday afternoon. The attendance is good and the exhibits are on an extensive scale.

An address of welcome was delivered by Mayor Frank R. Dawley, to which President Kinney responded. Following the reports of officers, H. B. F. De Thustup of Burlington read a paper on "Chrysanthemum Culture," and Prof. E. P. Sanderson of Durham, N. H., spoke on "The Need of National Control of Insecticides."

The society was welcomed to Montpelier last evening by Gov. George H. Prouty. A paper on "The Worst Fruit Insects of New England" was read by Prof. E. P. Sanderson of Durham, N. H., after which J. H. Hale of South Glastonbury, Conn., spoke on "New England's Opportunity."
