PESKY TRIED TO REACH HUB JEWELER IN COURT

Hahn Identifies Jewelry in New York and One of Prisoner--Boston Robbery Case Cleared.

New York, Nov. 13.—Watches and other jewelry in possession of William Pesky, Frank Marquette and Minnie Marquette when they were arrested in Brooklyn for a New York robbery were identified yesterday by Samuel J. Hahn, a Boston jeweler. Hahn said the watches were part of \$8,000 worth of jewelry stolen from his store at 1055 Washington street, Boston, on the night of Nov. 1.

Hahn identified Pesky as a man he had seen in his store in Boston. The prisoner sprang toward him, shouting, "You're a liar." He fought like a man, tables were overturned and the whole court room was in a turmoil. Finally, Pesky was overpowered and tied hand and foot. Mrs. Marquette screamed until she was carried from the court room to a cell.

PROSTRATED WITH GRIEF.

Shock of His Son's Death Too Much for Henry Watterson.

New York, Nov. 13.—It is likely that the body of Harvey Watterson, son of Henry Watterson of Louisville, Ky., who met tragic death late Wednesday by falling from a window in the 19th floor of a Wall street building, will be sent to his home in Louisville for burial.

It will be accompanied by the young widow, who was prostrated with grief when the news was conveyed to her. According to a telegram received here yesterday, the father, Henry Watterson, is too ill as the result of the shock to come for the body of his boy.

KING ENTERS YACHT. Alfonso to Send Soner Class Yacht to Maribhech. Boston, Nov. 13.—King Alfonso of Spain will send to Maribhech a small yacht of the soner class to participate in an international match to be sailed off Maribhech in the summer of 1910. The Eastern Yacht club announces that preliminary arrangements have been completed between that club and the Federal and Spanish Yacht clubs for the match. This announcement is a result of the visit to Spain of an American team of three yachts of the soner class, which raced a similar team of Spanish boats at Bilbao and San Sebastian.

According to custom established for soner class matches the Spaniards will send three boats to meet the Americans. Two of these will represent the Sebastian and Bilbao clubs respectively, and the third will be sent by King Alfonso. The terms of the match are to be framed, as in the case of the German match, to insure strictly national representation on both sides. The crews must be native born citizens of the country which they represent and the boats must be built and outfitted in their country, of materials manufactured there, even to the canvas of which their sails are made.

CHARGED WITH DESERTION. Husband of Senator Gorman's Daughter Placed on Trial. Philadelphia, Nov. 13.—Charged with desertion from the United States army, Charles J. Magness, husband of Ada Gorman, daughter of the late United States Senator Gorman of Maryland, was placed on trial yesterday before a court martial tribunal at the Philadelphia navy yard. Following the alleged desertion Magness married Miss Gorman. He was arrested, however, at the instance of the government and brought back to this city.
