

# AUSTRIA FIRM FOR PEACE

## Will Crush Any Move Toward Disturbance

### SITUATION IS DISQUIETING

No Progress on the International Congress—The Serbian Minister's Efforts Avert a Crisis in the Cabinet.

Berlin, Nov. 28.—The Balkan situation is considered here to have grown more disquieting. The Austro-Hungarian military preparations are taken to indicate that Austria-Hungary is determined to support her claims at all hazards and that she will promptly crush any attempt on the part of Serbia or Montenegro to disturb the peace. In the meantime negotiations for an international congress drag on. A semi-official announcement made yesterday declares that the German ambassador at Constantinople, Baron von Bihlerstein, pointed out to the sultan during a recent audience that the boycotting of German goods, as well as Austrian, threatens to endanger international relations. The report that Germany offered to bring about an agreement between Austria-Hungary and Turkey, through her ambassador at Constantinople, is without foundation.

### CABINET CRISIS AVERTED.

Serbian Minister's Efforts Are Successful.

Belgrade, Serbia, Nov. 28.—M. Milovanovich, the Serbian minister of foreign affairs, who recently returned here from a tour of the capitals of Europe in the interests of his government in the matter of the proposed international conference to settle the Balkan situation, seems to have satisfied his ministerial colleagues with the result of his efforts. This outcome probably will avert a cabinet crisis. The foreign minister declares that if the congress does take place Serbia will have no reason to be dissatisfied, as a number of her aspirations will be fulfilled.

### AGRICULTURE INSTITUTE MEETS.

General Assembly in Rome—Signor Tittoni President.

Rome, Nov. 28.—The general assembly of the International Institute of Agriculture met here yesterday under the presidency of Camille Barrore, the French ambassador to Italy. Signor Tittoni, the Italian minister of foreign affairs, was appointed president and M. Muraviev, the Russian ambassador, and Sidney A. Fisher, the Canadian minister of agriculture, were chosen vice-presidents.

## FOUND DYING BY MAN TO WHOM SHE WROTE

### Woman Said She Would Be Dead When Letter Was Delivered.

New York, Nov. 28.—A woman registered as Mrs. E. M. Cowper of Middletown, N. Y., was found dying in her room at the Hotel St. Regis yesterday morning with a bullet wound in her right temple.

John Hold called at the St. Regis at 10:20 o'clock and notified the manager that he had received a note from Mrs. Cowper in which she said that she would be dead before it reached him.

Mrs. Cowper was lying fully dressed on the bed. On a dresser two notes were found, one addressed to the coroner and the other to the Stephen Merritt Burial company. In the note to the coroner the woman said that the act was her own, and asked that her physician, Dr. J. H. Waterman of 50 West Fifty-first street, be notified. The note to the burial company directed them to take charge of her body.

Dr. Waterman hastened to the hotel, also Dr. L. Hill of 616 Madison avenue, and two other physicians. After a consultation the physicians decided that the woman was in too precarious a condition to be removed to a hospital.

At the hotel it was said that Mrs. Cowper was a writer of a number of books. No hope was entertained for her recovery.

### COOLIDGE RESIGNS.

#### To Quit His Post as U. S. Minister to Nicaragua.

Washington, Nov. 28.—John Gardner Coolidge of Massachusetts has resigned as United States minister to Nicaragua. It was announced at the state department yesterday that the resignation was entirely voluntary and that it was accepted with regret. Mr. Coolidge, it was said, had given any reason for his resignation. He has been minister to Nicaragua since last July, and prior to that was secretary to the American embassy in Mexico.

Mr. Coolidge is a resident of Boston and a graduate of Harvard. He has traveled extensively in South America, Samoa and the Orient.

## MOTHER DYING, GATES HAUNTS THE 'PHONE

### Financier Works On, But With Auto Ready to Whirl Him to Bedside.

Port Arthur, Tex., Nov. 28.—"How is mother now?" That question from John W. Gates goes 50 or more times a day over the private telephone wire strung from his mother's suite in the home he gave her on the Lake Shore drive in this city. At every unfavorable report he gets into the big chair constantly waiting for him and is whisked away to her bedside.

The Gates family life has been a beautiful example of eternal and filial devotion. Mother and son are inseparable, and of late years Mr. Gates has foregone many trips to remain near her. Her life has been given up by physicians as their work here, and the best hopes entertained for her were that she might live a few days after arriving in the warmer Texas climate. Since coming she has appeared to regain a little vitality, and it is believed her life may be prolonged for several weeks.

### OREGON'S SENATOR.

#### Taft and Hitchcock Impugnated to Aid Fulton.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 28.—The news that United States Senator Fulton is seeking the intervention of President Taft and National Chairman Hitchcock in the Oregon senatorial situation is received here with great interest. The legislature elected in June last is almost unanimously Republican. Of the ninety legislators, 81 voluntarily signed a pledge to elect as United States senator the popular choice. Also, at the June election, Governor George E. Chamberlain, a Democrat, was nominated for United States senator by the people. The nomination of a Democrat in a state which is Republican by 15,000 majority is generally attributed to factional strife between the Fulton and the anti-Fulton Republicans. Defeated in the Republican primaries last April by Judge Cake, it was charged in the most emphatic language at the meeting of the Union Republican club, the most important Republican club in this state, by the anti-Fulton people that Fulton faction threw their votes at the June election to Governor Chamberlain and thereby caused the defeat of Judge Cake.

### MANY MORE CHOLEERA CASES.

#### Alarming Increase in Disease in St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 28.—An alarming increase in Asiatic cholera has occurred in the last twenty-four hours, when twenty-seven new cases were reported. It was thought that the disease had been practically eradicated. Most of the cases are in well-to-do families, and they show all the virulence of the early days of the epidemic. Since the beginning of the epidemic there has been a total of 8,184 cases, 3,820 deaths and 4,008 recoveries.


### CANADA WATCHING.

#### Quarantine May Be Declared Along the Eastern Boundary Line.

They have decided to quarantine Maryland, and more states will soon follow. It is expected that the whole international boundary east of Lake Superior will be closed against cattle from the United States.

### HERPICIDE

#### Another State Quarantined.

The War on the Cattle Disease Continues.

Washington, Nov. 28.—The department of agriculture yesterday ordered a quarantine against the entire state of Maryland so far as cattle and sheep are concerned, on account of the appearance of foot and mouth disease. The restrictions put upon the state in the matter of the exportation of animals afflicted with the disease, are the same as those applied to Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey and Michigan.

The first reports of the prevalence of the epidemic came from Linshoro, which is but half a mile from the Pennsylvania state line. Secretary Wilson, Dr. D. A. Melvin, chief of the bureau of animal industry, and State Veterinarian Mackie of Maryland, were in consultation yesterday. In the opinion of Secretary Wilson the disease if checked immediately in all the states it has appeared will cost the government about \$500,000. The arrangement the department of agriculture has made with the states is that the government shall pay two-thirds and the state one-third of the cost of suppression.

### WHOLESALE VIOLATION OF THE POSTAL LAWS

#### Thousands of Copies of Speech of Gen. Sickles Franked.

Washington, Nov. 28.—Post office inspectors and officials of the department of agriculture are investigating a wholesale violation of the postal laws by some person or persons in the department of agriculture in the interest and Taft and Sherman during the recent campaign.

Someone, whose identity is understood to be still concealed, caused the insertion of thousands of copies of a speech by Gen. Daniel E. Sickles in the government mail. Before the violation was discovered and stopped, it is said that at least 7,000 copies of the speech were circulated. The penalty for the use of the government trunk for anything else than official business is \$500 for each offense. It will thus be seen that some one has incurred penalties in the interests of Taft and Sherman aggregating \$2,100,000.

It is understood that the Sickles speech was sent out in official envelopes of the department containing inquiries from the bureau of forestry. At first it was thought that the bureau of publications, the bureau of forestry and the bureau of statistics were all involved in this effort to aid Taft and Sherman at the government's expense in violation of law, but the inquiry seems to be narrowing the matter down to the bureau of statistics.
