LICENSE FEES FOR SCHOOLS

Is Proposal by the Vermont House of Representatives

AS PASSED BY THAT BODY

As Amended by Mr. Leary of Burlington, the Bill Makes the State Pay the Cost of Local Administration.

State House, Dec. 5.

If the bill that was passed in the House yesterday afternoon is also concurred in by the Senate, the permanent school fund will be augmented each year by the money received for license fees in the towns voting license after the expenses of the local administration of the sale of liquor are paid. This ought to amount to \$130,000 in two years.

Mr. DeBoer sought to amend House bill 22. The bill provided that a part of the money from the license fees go to the state and the other half be divided according to population among all the towns. In placing his amendment before the House, Mr. DeBoer said the House wanted to consider whether or not it believed it was right to take the money away from the places voting license in part, whether it had the right to take all of it, and if it decided that it had, whether it was willing to have the money so taken put into the permanent school fund. The morning vote decided that the House was satisfied with the idea of taking the money away from the towns voting license. Mr. Leary of Burlington made an amendment, which was agreed to, that the expenses of the license administration be paid by the state. Mr. Locklin, of the joint temperance committee, favored the passage of the Leary amendment.

Mr. DeBoer explained the scope of his amendment, saying that if the money was going to be taken away from license towns in part or in whole, he would like to see it go into the school fund. He said that the amendment did not affect the receipts which go to the state from the fourth class licenses, and that the state would have about \$12,000 in two years from this source to use as it saw fit. This would help to pay the expenses in the license administration in towns voting license.

Mr. DeBoer stated that he hoped some would feel uncertain about using the money received from the license fees for school purposes by which all the towns in the state would profit, because it was money any way that would go to something, and he was willing to place the school against the saloon. The saloon helped to support the institution which was working for the downfall of the saloon. It was like a see-saw, when one went up the other went down. Mr. Fletcher of Cavendish believed it was all wrong, taking away the license fees from the license towns, but if it was to be taken away, there was but one thing to be done with it, and that was to turn it into the permanent school fund. Mr. DeBoer's amendment was then passed and the bill was passed without further debate by a viva voce vote.

The amendments together read as follows: Section 1. Section 8129 of the public statutes of Vermont is hereby amended to read as follows: License fees shall be paid to the town treasurer, who shall immediately pay the same to the state treasurer. The state treasurer shall thereupon pay moneys so received to the trustees of permanent school fund (after deducting therefrom any sums which he has theretofore paid to towns to reimburse them for license fees, or parts thereof, refunded) and such moneys shall thereafter be held intact and in reserve as a part of the permanent public school fund provided for by section 1072 of the public statutes of Vermont. In case a town is required to refund a license fee, or part thereof, the state shall pay to such town the amount so refunded and the state treasurer shall from time to time deduct the amount of all sums so repaid to towns from any license fees which are thereafter paid to him for delivery to the permanent public school fund.

Section 2. The fees and expenses of the local administration of the licensing of the sale of liquor shall be paid by the state.

Section 3. This act shall take effect April 1, 1900.

Barre Vulcans Won at Basket Ball, 37 to 17

IN FAST, CLEVER CONTEST

In the First Two Periods the Monticula Boys from Northfield Put Up Stubborn Defense, but Were Outplayed in Last Period.

The Vulcans are rapidly becoming one of the fastest basket ball teams ever produced in the city and experienced no difficulty in defeating the Company F team from Northfield in the game played at Hale's pavilion last evening, the score being 37 to 17. 

Boston, Dec. 5.—Deplorable conditions attributed to the lack of modern equipment for the National Guard and to the failure of Congress to provide legislation to preserve New England's forests, are described by Governor Curtis Guild, jr., of Massachusetts in an article in the current number of the New England magazine. Governor Guild says:

CHAUFFEUR SENT TO JAIL.

He is Given Four Months For Manslaughter.

Harford, Conn., Dec. 5.—William E. Kibbe, whose automobile killed Mrs. Eliza F. Smith in front of the New York, New Haven and Harford railroad depot Oct. 19, while she was alighting from a trolley car and who pleaded guilty to a charge of manslaughter, was today sentenced to four months in jail. This is the second chauffeur sentenced this week by Judge Case, the other, W. H. Phair, going to state prison for four years. The court reviewed the case in detail and said that the extenuating circumstances were many. Judge Case differentiated between Kibbe's case and that of a chauffeur Phair, who, he said, killed a man while running a car when under the influence of liquor.
