ABOUT THE STATE

Wilder H. Worthen of St. Johnsbury has been appointed a deputy United States marshal by Marshal Horace W. Bailey.

The newly organized Italian band at Rutland has 25 members and made its initial appearance Monday evening, when it played at a christening.

With ice 11 inches thick and the promise of its being 14 inches by Friday, harvesting of the 1909 crop will be commenced by the Eddy Brothers at Rutland. About 20 men will be employed and three to five teams.

Miss Adelaide True, A. M., woman principal at Vermont academy, Sutton River, has resigned her position and gone to her home in Waterville, Me. She intends to go abroad soon. Miss True has been connected with the academy for six years.

It is expected that the pipe line of Brandon's new water system will be completed within a week or 10 days. Unless rains fall heavily, the village's present water supply will be exhausted within three weeks. With the new system connected, a water famine will be averted.

It will take a lot of rabbits to supply the Rutland County Fish and Game League with all 200 or more people can eat at the annual banquet to be held Thursday, January 14. T. J. Lalor and three East Wallingford men brought in 20 rabbits and 70 more are wanted. Two 140-pound deer are in cold storage and hopes are entertained of having a bear.

At W. R. Warner & Co.'s drug store in Vergennes, an interesting relic of the early settlers of Starkshoro is on exhibition. It is a mortar and pestle for grinding corn when grist mills were few and far between. The mortar and pestle are made of pepperidge wood and belong to R. H. Holcomb of West Addison. They were brought to Starkshoro by Mr. Holcomb's great grandfather, Solomon Holcomb, about 1790, when he moved from Canaan, Conn. The height of the mortar is about one and one-half feet, circumference about forty inches, and it has a capacity of about six quarts. The pestle is one foot long, with a handle of about two feet.

RECENT DEATHS OF VERMONTERS

Charles G. Williams, who for about 48 years was in the employ of the Central Vermont railway company, died at Essex Junction yesterday morning after a long illness. Mr. Williams was born in Royalton 81 years ago last April and obtained his education in the schools and academies at that place. When about 24 years old he began work for the Central Vermont at Montpelier and from there went to Windsor. Six years later he went to Essex Junction and had since lived there being station agent for about 40 years and finishing his work in that office about two years ago. Mr. Williams married Miss Louisa H. Howe of Royalton in 1850. Five children were born to them of whom, one daughter, Mrs. F. W. Baldwin, survives him. Mrs. Williams died nine years ago last summer. Mr. Williams was one of the nine children of Mr. and Mrs. David Williams and of his brothers and sisters, one brother, David G. Williams of New Newton, Mass., and one sister, Mrs. Ellen P. Child, who resided with him, survive. Mr. Williams was a Mason for 50 years and a charter member of Ethan Allen lodge of Essex Junction.

MORAN FAILING FAST.

Phoenix, Ariz., Dec. 30.—Dist. Atty. John B. Moran's health is failing fast. He had a fainting spell at his hotel a few days ago and a physician had to be called to resuscitate him. He has lost many pounds weight since coming here six weeks ago, and is quoted by an old friend who called on him yesterday as being indifferent to the progress of his disease.

STOLE FROM NEW FRIEND.

Burlington, Dec. 31.—John Call, who pleaded guilty to larceny before Justice DeBorville a few days ago, was taken before the justice yesterday for sentence. He was fined \$50 and costs of \$6.70, the alternative being 174 days in the House of correction. Call will have to take the alternative, as he is hard up for cash.

Call is an old hand at cheating people and this will not be the first sentence he has served by any means. He is charged in this case with stealing clothing from Cornelius Sullivan. A few nights ago Call worked on the sympathies of several people with more or less success and finally met Mr. Sullivan, to whom he put up very much of a hard luck story. Sullivan invited him to share his bed at 61 Bank street. Call accepted. During the night while Sullivan was asleep, Call arose and stole everything in sight, a suit of clothes, an overcoat, some old coats, pair of over-shoes, and even stockings. The matter was reported to the police and Call's arrest soon followed.

BELEAGUERED WITH SNOW.

All United Kingdom in Grip of The White Substance. London, Dec. 30.—The whole of the United Kingdom is in the grip of a violent blizzard which has raged for 48 hours. Northern railway service and street car traffic has been demoralized. Many towns are isolated and numerous accidents and deaths from exposure have been reported, as well as several shipping casualties, but fortunately, unattended by serious loss of life.

London is covered with a mantle of snow several inches in depth while drifts have blocked roads and rail-ways. The cross-channel service and telegraph and telephone lines in all directions have been suspended and all outdoor labor has ceased. Farmers are suffering severely in the loss of cattle and sheep.

The Scotch express bound for London is snowed up 18 miles from Aberdeen and the passengers were forced to spend the night there on board. The London express for Aberdeen also had a similar experience.
