IN SUIT IN N. Y.

Evidence Sent to U. S. Attorney Stimson.

WILL GIVE THEM TO JEROME

Criminal Action Looked For—Case to Be Presented to Grand Jury—Congress Committee Praises the Work at Panama.

Washington, Jan. 15.—It was learned yesterday upon reliable authority that the department of justice has turned over to United States District Attorney Stimson of the Southern District of New York all the papers connected with the Panama Canal purchase.

A meeting of the Senate committee on interoceanic canals will be called within a few days by Chairman Kittredge to consider the necessity of providing some means of obtaining additional funds for the construction of the canal.

The proposition advanced by several senators that the secretary of the treasury authorized to issue canal bonds in accordance with annual appropriations to be made by Congress is being considered by many senators.

RUSSIAN LOAN ARRANGEMENTS. \$30,000,000 of the Total to Be Placed in London.

London, Jan. 15.—Lord Revelstoke, acting for Baring Brothers & Co., and M. Routhowsky, the Russian financial agent resident in London, concluded arrangements yesterday for the English portion of the new Russian loan of \$240,000,000 about to be issued in Paris.

SHE TOLD, SO HE ADMITS

Farmer Confesses Slaying After Being Betrayed by Girl

HE HAD SWORN TO SECRECY

She Believed Death Near—Her Story Given While Ill After Collapse at Trial—Victim Was a Stranger.

York, Pa., Jan. 15.—Harry Keener, a York county farmer, yesterday confessed that the story told by a girl of this city that he had killed a man on his farm last July is true.

The identity of the victim is still a mystery, but the police hope to clear up missing points during the day. The girl accused Keener while she was lying on what was believed to be her deathbed, but the young farmer maintained his innocence until yesterday morning, when mentally tortured by the prolonged sweating process, he broke down and told the police that he had killed a man, and described what he had done with the body.

The girl is Miss Lorenza Tawser, aged 18 years. Last summer she was employed on Keener's farm near this city. Last week she attended the murder trial in this city of a negro, at which she was taken sick while listening to the testimony. After being taken home she was seized with spasms, and, fearing she would die, gave a detailed account of the crime to her mother. Her reason for not telling of the killing sooner, she said, was that she had been sworn to secrecy by Keener and was afraid to divulge it.

The local authorities were notified and Keener was taken into custody last Sunday. The girl said that Keener had buried the body in the orchard of the farm, and that he had painted the places where blood had spilt. For three days 25 men under the direction of the district attorney searched the farm and corroborated all the girl's statements except the burial of the body. The entire orchard had been ploughed up two or three feet deep. While this was going on Keener was constantly "sweated" by the police.

In his confession Keener said his victim was a stranger who came to his house in the night and without apparent provocation threatened to kill him. EXECUTED 872 IN 1908. Figures for Russia—There Were 1,957 Death Sentences. St. Petersburg, Jan. 15.—Statistics are published by the newspapers showing that during the year just ended, 1,957 persons were sentenced to death in the Russian empire and 782 executed. Sixty-three newspapers were suppressed and others fined to an aggregate amount of \$33,000.
