**WASHINGTON**

Funeral of Mrs. Cordelia Flint Who Died in 87th Year.

Mrs. Cordelia Flint, for many years a resident of the town of Washington, was buried yesterday in the cemetery there. A brief home-leaving service was held at her late home at one o'clock. The casket containing the remains was then borne to the Universalist church where the pastor, Rev. Irving Towles officiated, assisted by Rev. F. H. Perkins of the Baptist church. The choir rendered appropriate selections of music.

The bearers were George Flint, Lucius Flint, Ellis Downing, Fred Grant, Charles Clough, and Bert Caldwell.

Cordelia's Newman was born in Morristown, Vt., April 21, 1822. She died Jan. 12 in her 87th year. She was one of six daughters of William and Rebecca Newman. There was also one half brother. Her grandmother was of southern birth and her grandfather, a sea captain, was brought into this country by the famous war on Lake Champlain, the widow remaining here after her husband's death in the war.

In December, 1847, Cordelia was united in marriage, at Barre, to Samuel Winslow Flint. The couple came at once to Washington to make their home and lived together here for almost fifty-five years when the husband passed on before October 6, 1902. Since that time she and her only daughter, Mrs. Ellis Spencer, have lived with and for each other.

Of Mrs. Flint's sisters' children there are now living Mrs. Flora Hodgeman, Los Angeles, Cal.; Mrs. Harvey Cobb, Roxbury, Mass.; Mrs. Emma Grant, Chelsea, Mass.; Albert Newman, Revere, Mass. There are also a number of children of her half brother.

Although Mrs. Flint was a very small and light woman, she was always the efficient mistress of her own home and the friend, nurse and benefactor to many in sickness or in need. Night or day her ministering angel. Even until this last Christmas she selected gifts to be sent where she thought they would be most needed.

For about three years she has been feeble and part of the time confined to her bed, but always patient and trusting. In the best sense of the word she was a religious woman, ever careful for true reverence and holy living. Recognizing the part of serviceableness in religion she was ever careful that she might never be found to have been remiss in even the most humble duty. The last nights of her life were made sacred to her and her family by the prayers of all as she was left to her rest.

Of her own intimate friends very few now remain, but many of the younger generations are glad to tell of her many good works. She passed away with a vital confidence in the personal ministrations of her Savior and we feel that she is certainly at rest.
