FUGITIVE ARRESTED FOR VERMONT COURT Edward J. Ellard, Wanted on Charges of Larceny and Attempt to Kill Officer at South Hero. Bellevue, Que., Jan. 16.—Edward J. Ellard, an alleged fugitive from justice wanted at South Hero, Vt., to answer to the charges of larceny and attempt to kill, was arrested here early Thursday morning by the chief of police of Valleyfield, Que., and Cornelius F. Aegan of the Wood-Morgan detective agency of Boston and a man from the Thiel detective bureau of Montreal. The clearest of a woman connected with the Boston agency is said to have been instrumental in the capture of Ellard. The affair in which Ellard is charged with assault with intent to kill occurred at South Hero on the evening of Nov. 13. He had returned to South Hero that day after an absence following his alleged participation in the robbery of a large creamery concern. Ellard concealed himself while he sent a trusted messenger with \$1,000 to secure the release on bail of a woman who had been arrested charged with receiving stolen goods. The authorities could not question the validity of the bail money, though they suspected from what source it came, and the woman was allowed to go on bail. That night Deputy Sheriff Friend went to Ellard's house. Ellard was found there, and while attempting to make his escape is alleged to have shot Sheriff Friend through the arm, but he was captured and landed in jail. The bailed woman was at once re-arrested and held on an additional charge. Four days later, on Jan. 2, between 5 and 6 p. m., Ellard escaped from the jail, and John G. Sargent, attorney general of Vermont, was notified. He at once communicated with the Boston authorities and, although the fugitive was well supplied with money, his arrest was brought about in a short time.

Tampa, Fla., Jan. 16.—The Duke Pompeii Little of Lombardy, owner of a large tract of land in Manatee county, about seventy-five miles south of Tampa, has offered it to the Italian government for the use of a proposed colony of earthquake survivors. The land is below the frost line and has climatic conditions similar to those of Southern Italy. Oranges, lemons, limes, grape fruit and pineapples will be grown by the colonists. The colony will be named "New Messina" according to the plans outlined by the Duke's attorneys here.
