### SUES FOR \$10,000.

Employee of Hartford Woolen Company Claims Negligence.

Rutland, Jan. 28.—Orrin Lashway of Easthampton, Mass., has brought a negligence suit in United States court in Vermont against the Hartford Woolen company of Hartford to recover \$10,000 for injuries alleged to have been received when he fell through a floor while he was employed in the company's mill. The case is returnable at the February term of the court in Burlington.

A promissory note made by one partner alone for a firm debt is held in Burdett versus Hayman (W. Va.), 69 S. E. 497, 15 L. R. A. (N. S.), 1019, not to operate as payment nor to release another partner from the debt unless the creditor agrees so to accept it.

A tax upon the shares of a bank's stock and upon its assets is held in East Livermore versus Livermore Falls Trust and Banking company (Me.), 69 Atl. 906, 15 L. R. A. (N. S.), 982, to be double taxation and not leviable in the absence of express legislative authority.
