**DONAHUE UNLUCKY PLAYER.**  
Offered Big Salary to Join Detroit But Turned It Down.  
Francis "Red" Donahue, former Nap twirler, but more recently of Detroit fame, might be called the unlucky chap in baseball, says a Cleveland writer, Patrick Dougherty, of the White Sox, who also covered the outfield for Boston and New York, might well be termed the lucky guy of the diamond. At the close of the 1908 season Donahue quit baseball to go into the hotel business at Philadelphia. There was no dispute about salary and despite all the efforts of the "Tiger" management Donahue refused to join the Detroit club when it started South in the spring of 1907.

When Donahue quit baseball he had as much as he ever boasted of as a pitcher. He always used his brains when working, and was so effective against several American league clubs that he earned his salary if only to work against them. An excellent opportunity to go into business was accepted by Donahue, but there is a question if that was the real reason of his retirement. "Red" had managerial aspirations, and insists to this day that the owners that he promised him that he should succeed Stahl as manager at Washington. When the job was landed by Cantillon it's history that Donahue announced his retirement. The Tigers finished sixth in 1906, but early in the spring of 1907 gave indications of being a contender in the race. In the mid season they dropped into Philadelphia for a series and Donahue called on Jennings to pay his respects. At that time the Tigers were in a bad way for pitchers, and Jennings was eager to sign Donahue up, as he was in good shape, having pitched a number of semi-professional games. He went so far as to offer him a fat contract and a bonus in case the Tigers landed the pennant, with a full share of the world's series thrown in. "Red" couldn't see the Tigers as a pennant possibility, and scorned the offer. Not only did he lose a fat sum of money in 1907 by refusing to join Detroit but he also passed up another when the Tigers repeated last year.

Dougherty, on the other hand, after twice playing on the Boston winners, and getting a share of the world's series with Pittsburgh, was sold to New York. He showed miserably with the "Yankees" and was sold to the White Sox when that team was in bad shape for outfielders. New York at that time was leading the league while Chicago was a bad sixth. The Sox shortly afterwards started on the winning streak that finally landed the pennant for them. In the big series with the Cubs Dougherty got a full share. Thus a poor showing with New York eventuated to be sold to the team that eventually won the pennant.

**ABOUT THE STATE**

Last Sunday the Rev. G. H. Bennett read his resignation as pastor of the Baptist church in Vergennes to take effect May 1. The reason for the resignation is the desire of the state convention board to arrange for one pastor to take charge of the Vergennes and Pantion churches in order to reduce expenses. The immediate occasion for the resignation was the fact that the Pantion pastor is to leave soon and Mr. Bennett resigns so that both churches may be free to choose a joint pastor.

The St. Albans city council held a cleaning up session Monday evening, with the ending of the fiscal year and reports of the various officers. The mayor was authorized to draw several warrants, one for \$5,000 for bonded relief interest, one for \$2,000 for \$2,000 for school teachers' salaries, it having developed that the school commissioners have already exceeded their yearly appropriation and several months' expenses are yet to be provided for. The report of the overseer of the poor showed that the total expense of that department was \$20,113 of which \$206 was for salary. Chief of Police Mahoney reports a total of 103 arrests, classified as follows: Intoxication 30; breach of the peace 20; grand larceny 2; petit larceny 5; tramps 10; selling liquor 1; violation of ordinances 3; gambling 1; truancy 1; fraud 1; mitimisses 29. Twenty-five cases were called, three sent to the house of correction and one to the industrial school. The net cost of the police force was \$10,133.66. Chief Derrick of the fire department reported 51 alarms during the year, 16 regular, 23 stills and two out of town. The department expenses were economically administered, \$169 being left in the treasury.

**GUARDING GRANT'S TOMB AGAIN.**  
Protection Against Vandalism is Necessary.  
New York, Feb. 3.—In response to a letter from General Horace Porter, president of the Grant Monument association, complaining that the tomb on Riverside Drive was being injured by grown-up vandals and boys, Police Commissioner Bingham yesterday re-established a special detail of three policemen to guard the tomb. The three men selected are veterans of the Civil War. They will be on guard in eight-hour shifts. The protection of the tomb was a special post of General Bingham, luncheon commissioner, but was suspended by him as unnecessary.

**HARDY BANANAS.**  
American Company in Mexico Tries an Experiment.  
Salina Cruz, Mexico, Feb. 3.—The Mexican-Pacific company, Morris Thompson of Seattle, president, has planted 10,000 acres in bananas in the state of Acapulco as an experiment. If the fruit grows successfully the company will plant an additional 20,000 acres. This is the first time that bananas have been tried at such an altitude or so far north. The plants used are of an especially hardy character, although the fruit grown from them does not differ in any way from that commonly seen.
