SOME LABOR HISTORY SAYS BEWARE OF BACKACHE

Success of Trades Unionism in Great Britain.
FIRST UNION IN AMERICA.
Rise and Decline of the Knights of Labor—Phenomenal Growth of the American Federation—Strength of Unaffiliated Organizations.

In America and to a large extent in England a considerable majority of workmen believe in the principles and scheme of trades unionism. In continental Europe trades unionism has been abandoned largely for socialism. To appreciate the rapid strides of trades unionism in England and the benefits won for their members two salient facts may be mentioned. Less than a generation since the large manufacturing interests concentrated their energies on parliament for the enactment of the drastic "combinations law," which made it a crime for workmen to assemble and discuss measures for their benefit. The defeat of this measure called forth all the resources and courage of men like Bright, Cobden and Goldwin Smith.

Tyrannous though this measure was in spirit, it appears liberal when compared with the preceding "statute of laborers," which set forth that "every man or woman, free or bound, able in body and within the age of three-score years, shall be bound to serve the employer who shall require him to do so and shall take only the wages which are accustomed to be taken in the neighborhood where he is bound to serve." This was subsequently supplemented by an act of parliament which arbitrarily fixed the wages at which the laborer must work, no less volume. Under its provision the workman was forbidden to leave his native parish in search of higher wages. The penalty for violation of these statutory provisions was "that he be branded on the forehead with a red-hot iron."

Trades unionism in England has outlived these violent measures for its repression and has succeeded in electing members of its councils to seats in parliament. The first labor union in the United States of which there is any historical record was that of the shipwrights, who formed a society in New York in 1808. The tailors and carpenters organized in 1806. In the next four or five decades organizations were established in most of the great industries, some of which lasted only a few years. Many of these gradually became national.

INDIAN PAGEANT AT THE CHAMPLAIN FETE
Director in Burlington, Looking Over Possible Sites—His Opinion of The Celebration and Its Attendance.
Dr. L. O. Armstrong, who had the direction of the Indian pageants and exhibitions at the Quebec tercentenary celebration last year and who has closed a contract with the Vermont and New York commissions for the Indian pageants on Lake Champlain during the tercentenary celebration of the discovery of that water, the week of July 4, was in Burlington this week.

While in Burlington Mr. Armstrong made an inspection of the harbor front and recommended several locations for the exhibit. He expressed himself as well satisfied with the outlook for location. "Your city will be crowded with visitors throughout the week," said Mr. Armstrong. "Wherever I go I hear people talking about the great event and planning to spend the week of July 4 in the Valley of Champlain. Some people have asked me since I arrived here if I did not find Vermonters slow in taking hold of the enterprise—and surely it is an enterprise—but my answer has always been in the negative. I think your people have acted nobly in this matter. You're ahead of the people of Quebec in planning an event similar to the one held last year in the Canadian city. If you keep the good work ahead—very minute gaining impetus—you will have a celebration that will make a record."
