PROCTOR FILES SUIT.
Ties Up Brattleboro Firm By Injunction Writ.

Brattleboro, Feb. 23.—A bill in chancery with injunction attached was filed in the county clerk's office yesterday afternoon in the case of William H. Proctor against James F. Hooker, Maude E. Hooker, William H. Corser and Charles D. Whitaker, giving the details of the affairs of the Hooker, Corser & Mitchell company, makers of overalls and garments, which make an interesting story.

The injunction signed by Chancellor E. M. Butler of Rutland and served by Deputy Sheriff A. W. J. Wilkins restrains the defendants from hindering or obstructing Mr. Proctor in the conduct of the business and gives him access to the mail, bank accounts and books and also restrains the defendants from attempting to act under a meeting of Jan. 16, when Mr. Proctor was turned down as a director and Maude E. Hooker, wife of James F. Hooker, was elected in his place.

The business was bought of a former partnership in 1902 for \$120,000. Mr. Hooker took 550 shares, Mr. Corser 150 shares, Mr. Whitaker 400 shares and Mr. Proctor 500 shares at \$100 a share, and all were made directors. The business has been exceedingly profitable and the shares are now worth \$175.

Mr. Proctor says the net yearly profit since the new company was organized has been more than 40 per cent on the capital stock after paying salaries; that in dividends and compensation there has been paid to him \$73,000, to Mr. Corser \$47,000, to Mr. Whitaker \$48,000 and to Mr. Hooker \$58,000; that a surplus of \$63,700 has been accumulated, that the firm has owed no debts the past three years and that the results of the business are in large measure attributed to his management.

When the business was bought a contract was entered into providing as to the salaries and how the profits of the business should be divided. Mr. Proctor says that before the beginning of this year the other directors planned to defraud him and deprive him of his authority in the management, to deprive of his salary and compensation due under the contract and to break the contract. He alleges the company never had by-laws, but that Mr. Hooker fraudulently procured his signature to an agreement for the adoption of by-laws. The annual meeting took place Jan. 16. Counsel was present, but not in Mr. Proctor's interest. By-laws were adopted, but Mr. Proctor says they were not to his liking and that he did not vote for them.

When the vote for directors was counted it was found that Mrs. Hooker had been elected a director in Mr. Proctor's place. Immediately at the close of the meeting Mr. Hooker, acting for the other directors, delivered to Mr. Proctor a written notice that from that date the contract was terminated. Mr. Proctor says he was excluded from participating in the business, access to the mail and bank accounts was denied him and new books were put on the office. Mr. Proctor asks the court to enforce specific performance of the contract if it is determined that it can be lawfully carried out, otherwise to appoint a receiver to liquidate the property and divide the proceeds.

The matter will be heard at the April term of county court.

ABOUT THE STATE

Frank Trombley, the youthful burglar, who last Friday night, for the second time in two years, looted the grocery store of Charles H. Trudeau at St. Albans, was Monday arraigned before Judge Post in city court in St. Albans and held to the next term of the March term of Franklin county court. Mr. Trudeau had yet another charge to press against Trombley when the burglarly case was disposed of. Mr. Trudeau is a dealer in pelts, hides and skins as a side line and on February 13 Trombley appeared at his store and offered for sale a number of small skins. A bargain was reached and the skins bought and placed in the back room of the store. Trombley went out the front door and around to the back one, and stole the skins within three minutes and resold them to O. E. Wilson. This case will be taken up later. Trombley, who is still under 20 years of age, is from his actions and thought a typical thief and degenerate.

West Rutland Town Hall Opened.

With ceremonies, including an orchestral concert and a dance, West Rutland's new \$30,000 town hall was formally opened Monday night, the large crowd present including not only the townpeople, but also many visitors from places in the vicinity. The event was looked forward to for several months since the hall has been nearing completion, as the crowning one of an era of rebuilding here since the destructive fire of a few years ago, which wiped out practically all the principal business blocks of the town and proved a severe blow to local industry.

Although the structure is not wholly finished, the opening had been delayed so long that arrangements were finally made with the contractor, C. L. LeBoeuf, to have the ceremonies Monday night.

The new town hall, the foundations for which were laid in May, 1908, is a three-story building, located at the east end of the triangle bordered by Main and Marble streets and Campbell avenue. The cost of \$30,000 includes the land on which it is erected. The structure is 100 feet deep with a frontage of 50 feet, and is of red brick, with marble trimmings.

"Kokee Koons Kake Walk."

A crowd of over 1,500 people, who seemed content to do anything from perching at a high altitude on the running track to stretching in an endeavor to peer over five rows of ladies' hats in an attempt to see, filled the university of Vermont gymnasium at Burlington Monday night, when the annual "kake walk" was held. The winners of the large cake and the cup were the members of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity and they triumphed over a list of stunts which for artistic design and originality have never been surpassed. The objectionable features of most "kake walks," such as the long waits and general confusion, were nearly done away with last night, owing to the untiring efforts of those in charge, to whom great credit is due. Not a number lagged and only the minimum of time needed for the staging of a stunt was consumed. The stunts carefully kept away from the time-worn jokes, and everything sprung was new and original. The college band is also deserving of mention for the good band of music put up by them. The band has grown to be something the college ought to be proud of.

The walking for the cake by couples was not neglected, either, and although the judges announced that they had no difficulty in picking the winners, it was hard for the audience to decide which of the seven couples would come in ahead. The cake was won by Burrage and Dow.

BOYS' HOME DEDICATED.

New Building at Saxtons River Is Opened.

Bellows Falls, Feb. 24.—Just at the hour that President Roosevelt was welcoming home the sailor boys at Hampton roads, Warner Home at Saxtons River, Vt., was being dedicated to the work of training homeless boys to good citizenship. This institution accommodating 25 boys, is a branch of the Kura-Hattin home, founded by Dr. C. A. Dickenson, an ex-pastor of Berkeley Temple, Boston, the administrator, builder and other homes are at Westminster, Vt.

Warner Home, a commodious brick building with 100 acres of land, was the gift of the late Mrs. Sarah Warner, widow of Den. S. L. Warner of Saxtons River, it being her ancestral home. An annex has just been completed at an expense of about \$10,000. The location and buildings are ideal.

This annex and the rebuilding of the administration building begun last year were made possible by Mrs. Frederick Billings of Woodstock, Vt., whose generous gifts turned the tide of abandonment of the homes, into an inspiration to raise the necessary funds to continue the work.
