OUR CRIMINAL LAW.

Important Opinion by Attorney-General John G. Sargent.

Attorney General John G. Sargent has given an opinion to H. F. Graham, state auditor of accounts, that the costs of prosecution and commitment of prisoners committed to the county jail by any court inferior to the county court are to be paid by the town or city in which the offense is committed, and if the prosecution is upon complaint of a village police officer, by the village in which the offense is committed.

The state auditor has appraised the justices and municipal judges of the ruling and they must govern themselves accordingly. It means that in the future many cases which the state has been paying the costs of will be taxed against the towns and that in practically all cases except highway offenses, justice and city courts take jurisdiction of the towns and cities must be responsible for the costs. Previously on the long terms, that is sentences running from three months to one year, the prisoners were sentenced to the house of correction and the state paid the costs of prosecution and commitment. Under the new law all sentences for one year or less except for felony must be to the county jails, with the result that at the present time the jail is filling up so rapidly that the prison board are being urged to use their utmost efforts to secure employment for the prisoners. Some of the county jails are now reported to have more prisoners than ever before in their history, with nothing for them to do but sit around and eat the state's grub and play forty five.

ABOUT THE STATE

Twenty Rutland musicians have formed a festival orchestra with C. A. Eastbrook as director.

Ralph A. Booth, an assistant teacher at People's academy, Meriville, has been assigned to take up farming in Connecticut.

Repairs contemplated on the Soldiers' home at Bennington will include painting the main building and shingling the hospital.

The Rev. J. E. Calow, lately stationed at Windsor, has entered upon his duties as chaplain of the Fanny Allen Hospital, succeeding the late Rev. Dr. A. J. Glynn.

The certificate of the increase of capital stock of the Burlington Machine & Repair Co. was filed yesterday in the office of the Burlington city clerk. The capital stock is increased from \$2,600 to \$3,000.

W. H. Nelson, for the past seven years a special pension examiner in this district, has resigned. He goes next week to Oklahoma to resume the practice of the law, which he gave up to accept a position in the pension department. It is not known who is to succeed him.

How Many Fishlines to a Man?

Attorney General John G. Sargent of Ludlow has been asked to decide how many lines can be used legally in fishing through the ice for pickerel in Lake Bomoseen. Good winter fishing has been enjoyed at the lake for some years, anglers using 10 lines to a man, until about a month ago, when State Fish and Game Commissioner H. G. Thomas of Stowe instructed the wardens to allow only two lines per man held in the hand.

This ruling was not made under a new law, but by the provisions of an old one, long a dead letter, which was unearthed soon after the last legislature passed an act permitting winter fishing for pickerel in most of the waters of the state not inhabited by trout.

There are a number of people in Rutland who do not agree with Mr. Thomas in his interpretation of the statute relative to Lake Bomoseen fishing. One of these is Judge G. L. Howe, and as a result of correspondence received from Judge Howe, Mr. Thomas has put the matter up to the attorney general.
