## ENGAGE AN AIR SHIP

Burlington's Champion Committee to Have a Noveltv.

Burlington, March 22.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the local aeronautical organization, held last evening, a deal was consummated with S. L. Tapp, representing T. J. Sperry's airship, for an airship during the week of Burlington's celebration of the discovery of Lake Champlain. The airship will be 35 feet in length and 14 feet in diameter, and a telegram received from Mr. Sperry last evening guaranteed it to be the fastest airship in the world. It will make two ascensions daily, in the afternoon and evening, on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and for the remainder of the week if the committee decide to continue the celebration that long. The evening trip will be spectacular, being under the glare of a large searchlight placed on the highest central building. The airship will be located on the city market grounds.

The committee is also arranging for an elaborate exhibition of fireworks by Fane of New York, of which the set pieces will probably be the most intricate and beautiful ever seen in Vermont. The exhibition will be set off from a raft on the lake so that the large amphitheatre may be used to advantage by spectators, and so that added pyrotechnic effects may be gained by the reflection of lights on the water.

## POCKETBOOK FOUND

Minne \$145, Stolen From B. F. Adams at Manchester, N. H.

Manchester, N. H., March 22.—The pocket book stolen from B. F. Adams of Danville, Vt., at the depot Saturday, since the FBI removed by the pocketbook, was found by Mrs. Emma A. Hillsgrove of Riverside. Mrs. Hillsgrove had business in this city Saturday, and between 11 and 12 o'clock, while passing through the north entrance of the depot, she discovered the empty pocket book on the floor.

## New Blow at the White Plague

Since Koch, of Germany, discovered the tubercle bacillus, the germ, it is extremely doubtful whether there has been a successful research of greater moment to the disease-fighting scientist and the public at large than that just announced in Philadelphia. This discovery is proving in many cases—not four or six, but fifty or sixty—the presence of the tubercle bacillus in the blood of a human being and in establishing beyond all doubt that human blood acts as a conveyor of the consumption germ from one organism of the body to another.

All of the tests and final demonstration of what had been largely the theory are the work of Dr. Rappin C. Rosenburg, bacteriologist of the Philadelphia General Hospital and also bacteriologist of the Jefferson Medical College, either of which positions is a mark of distinction in Philadelphia. The problem that has long been puzzling scientists in this particular field has been the mode of transmission of the organism, say, from the lungs to the intestines, from the lungs to other internal organs, or vice versa. Naturally the blood has been considered the possible carrier, but no one to the present time has been able to demonstrate the organisms in the blood by simple methods. It has been taught and believed for years, especially during the last few years, that tuberculosis was not hereditary but that the person so afflicted was first so lowered in body resistance, from various causes, that he was a fit subject for the disease in this condition acquired it from some outside source, such as the sputum of another person, through milk or food, and even other means of contact with germ-infected articles or persons.

The finding of the germ in the blood of these cases, and many more probably to be found in the future, has straightened out many perplexing problems. It is the "missing link," as it were, in the chain cycle of the disease and the one thing which will, with our doubt, give scientists a definite basis of ground upon which they can base their future efforts to stamp out the disease which, in some form, attacks about sixty per cent of the population of the United States. It will stimulate many co-workers to further efforts in the hope, since to science nothing now seems utterly impossible, of finding that "some thing" which will check, hold and vanquish the bacillus causing all damage.—From "New Blow at the White Plague," in Technical World Magazine for April.

## Vermont Optometry Board

The Vermont board of examiners in optometry held its first meeting at the Brooks house, Brattleboro, March 10 and 11, 1909. The organization was effected by the election of H. F. Jordan, Brattleboro, president; A. S. Haskins, St. Johnsbury, secretary; A. R. Slader, Rutland, treasurer. On May 12, 1909, a meeting of the board will be held at the Brooks house, Brattleboro, for the purpose of taking action upon the applications for exemption certificates. On June 16 and 17, 1909, the board will meet in Montpelier for the purpose of examining all eligible applicants desiring to commence the practice of optometry in the state of Vermont, under restrictions of the law of January 9, 1909. No person not a holder of a certificate of registration or exemption, duly issued and recorded, shall, after the first day of July, 1909, practice optometry within this state. It is especially requested by the board that all applications for exemption certificates be properly filled out, verified, and promptly returned to the secretary before May 12, 1909, thus avoiding delay and additional expense of another meeting. Application blanks for exemption or examination can be obtained from A. S. Haskins, secretary, St. Johnsbury, Vt.
