MONTPELIER

Welcome Lamphere was arraigned in city court, yesterday morning on the charge of intoxication, having been arrested Sunday afternoon by Chief Dur-

The officer found him at the Sabin crossing after going up in response to a telephone message to the effect that there was a disturbance in that vicinity.

Lamphere pleaded guilty to a third offense of intoxication and was given a fine of \$15, with costs of \$7.14, or a sentence in jail, which he took on account of the lack of cash to settle the fine.

Overseer Lamphere has sent Mrs. Chesley T. Sabin to Heaton hospital for treatment. He is also trying to locate her husband who at last accounts went to Burlington several weeks ago. They came to Vermont from Maine and have lived in Bradford and Plainfield. Sabin claimed to be a sewing machine agent or repairer. They have six children.

One was placed out with a local family by the overseer at the mother's request and the others are with a brother in Maine. The family have been stopping at the Union house.

The members of the Washington County Bar association met yesterday morning in the court house for the purpose of discussing the proposed changes in the court rules, as proposed by the judges of the superior court some time ago. The rules as they stand now cover 38 typewritten pages and yesterday's session of the association was long enough for the attorneys to look over 13 pages of them. The remainder of the rules will be discussed at a meeting of the association to be held Friday evening at the court house.

Deputy Secretary of State Herbert E. Slayton, who has been employed at the State House for the past three years, has resigned his position under Secretary of State G. W. Bailey, and will begin the study of law immediately. Mr. Slayton succeeded George L. Hunt of Island Pond, under the administration of F. G. Fleetwood, and has held the office since that date. His place will be taken by Rawson Myrick of Middlebury, who will do the work of making out the card index system, which has been applied to the vital statistics in the office.

TRIED OUT GERMANY.

England Inquired Informally About Naval Expenditures.

London, March 23.--In the House of Commons yesterday, replying to a question whether without detriment to the public interest, he could say upon what occasions Great Britain had approached Germany with regard to a material reduction of naval expenditures. Prime Minister Asquith said that the matter, during last year, had more than once formed the subject of informal communications between the two governments with a view, on the part of Great Britain, of ascertaining whether such proposals would be entertained by Germany.

The government had not formulated any proposals to Germany, because it had been given to understand that the German naval program had been fixed by law and was in no way dependent upon anything Great Britain might do.
