ROOSEVELT AT SEA. He Spent Yesterday Afternoon in Getting Rested. On board steamship Hamburg, March 24, (via wireless.)—Ex-President Roosevelt spent the better part of the afternoon in his first few hours at sea, in resting from the fatigue of his strenuous departure when thousands of his friends and well wishers bade him goodbye.

The weather was clear and balmy, the sea smooth, and although the day was such a one as would tempt the sea voyager to the deck and open air, but Col. Roosevelt had risen early and had passed through a most tiring though pleasing experience, so he decided after luncheon, to seek the seclusion of his stateroom. Kermit Roosevelt and the other members of the party, however, spent the afternoon in the open resting on deck chairs. Mr. Roosevelt and his party had lunch on and dinner at Capt. Burmeister's table. At both meals the ex-president's expedition into Africa was the chief topic, and Mr. Roosevelt spoke enthusiastically of the pleasure the hunting trip afforded him. With Mr. Roosevelt and Kermit on the Smithsonian hunting expedition are Major E. A. Mearns, of the medical corps, U. S. A., and J. Loring Allen and Edmund Heller, naturalists of note, who will seek specimens for the Smithsonian Institute. They occupied staterooms on the Hamburg adjoining the Roosevelt suite. The naturalists preceded Mr. Roosevelt on board the Hamburg.

LOCOMOTIVE EXPLODED. Engineer and Fireman Instantly Killed—Brakeman Blown Off The Train. Buffalo, N. Y., March 24.—Engineer Henry Kabel and Fireman John Gies of an eastbound Lehigh Valley freight were almost instantly killed yesterday afternoon about five o'clock near Corfu. The boiler of the engine exploded. Henry C. Meyers, a brakeman, was blown from the top of the string of cars by the force of the explosion. He landed in a ditch and is internally injured. The members of the crew all lived in Buffalo. The engine, which is one of the larger type, was puffing along the level stretch of track at a fair rate of speed when suddenly there was a terrific explosion. The engine trucks fell onto the tracks about 50 feet away from the rest of the train and the boiler, splitting in half, crashed in a heap of bent and twisted boiler plate and pipe in a ditch about 20 feet away from the tracks. Kabel was crushed under the boiler. Part of his head was free. He muttered a few words to Conductor Beards, who had rushed forward from the caboose, and then died in great agony. The force was such that every house in Corfu shook and some window panes were broken. Four cars were lifted from the rails.

INCREASE APPROPRIATION. For Use on Roads in Rutland County Towns This Year. Rutland, March 24.—There was an attendance of forty at the Rutland county road meeting which was held here today with State Commissioner Gate in charge. Rutland county towns voted \$6,270 for road work this year, which is an increase of \$3,780 over last season. Six towns avail themselves of the full appropriation from the state.
