ALLEGED SWINDLER HEAD.



WILL WORK OUT HIS DEBT.

Southern Preacher of 60 Goes to New York to Discharge Obligation. New York, March 25.--Hale and hearty at 62, and as full of enthusiasm as a boy of 12, the Rev. Joseph X. Diller of Nassau, Island of New Providence, Bahamas, has arrived in town to work out a debt of \$127 to E. C. Williams a wholesale grocer in Hudson street. He expects to do manual labor, and figures that it will take six months to liquidate the obligation.

The Rev. Mr. Diller is an ordained Baptist missionary who spent 21 years in the Allegheny and Blue Ridge mountains, where he walked 13,500 miles preaching and distributing tracts and made many converts.

He decided eight years ago to give up preaching and spend his remaining years in Nassau. So he went there and opened a little notion store on Bay street and a grocery shop on New Road street. In the first he placed the wife of a minister and in the second a male clerk. In 1903 he found he needed more capital, and came to New York to raise \$1,000 among friends. The friends failed him, but Mr. Williams advanced him groceries to the value of \$173. With these returned.

When I got to Nassau I found that the minister's wife had robbed me, even to taking my sewing machine," he said. "The clerk had fed his family out of my store, and I was down and out. There was so little left that I sold both shops. I don't blame the clerk, but I do blame the minister's wife."

Mr. Diller has taken a room in Leonard street and hopes to earn enough by preaching and selling English notions to keep a roof over his head and food on his table while he works out his debt.

AVERTS PANIC.

Actor Reassures Audience During Gun Fight in Theatre. El Paso, Tex., March 25.--Richard Carle, the New York actor, prevented a panic here last night in the opera house when a gun fight took place in the upper gallery. Women screamed and started running, whereupon the occupants of the lower floor and second balcony also attempted to rush out. Carle shouted up into the balcony:

"All right, I've had one, but I'll go out and take another with you if you'll wait till I get my coat. I'm sorry you can't wait till the performance is over." This reassured the people below, who had thought a fire had broken out, and the panic was stayed.


