ABOUT THE STATE

They are still changing names around Barton. Monday the Boston & Maine railroad decreed that South Newbury shall be Conley; Stanstead Junction, Beeda Junction; Beeda Plain, Beeda. It takes a level headed traveler to arrive where he is going.

It looks good to Ludlow to see right or 10 cars arrive for freight, at the request of shippers, and find there is no room for them in the railroad yard because all the space is occupied by cars being loaded. Pulp wood, lumber, chairs and other commodities swell the list of Ludlow products bound out.

One Vermont girl is among the 21 elected from a senior class of 470 at Smith college, Northampton, Mass., to membership in Phi Beta Kappa, the national society to which only college students of the highest standing are eligible. She is Florence Eva Paine of White River Junction. Election to the society is made on a basis of scholarship throughout the entire college course.

The 10 prisoners taken to the Rutland county jail from Chittenden county jail will be obliged to work in the shops at the house of correction just the same as though they were sent there from Rutland county towns. The number in both institutions is unusually small. With Chittenden's 10, there are only 60 in the county jail and 63 in the house of correction compared with 140 to 165 up to this winter.

In Vermont department of the Grand Army of the Republic, deaths have been more numerous than additions since 1890 when the organization reached its highest enrollment with 112 posts and a membership of 5,478. December 31, 1907 it had 2,707 members in 92 posts. In 1875 there were 561 comrades in 13 posts. A steady growth was noted until 1882 when the posts numbered 47. The following year 27 new posts were formed, the next year nine and after that several a year was the record.

Mrs. Ella H. (Johnson) Hill, wife of William H. Hill, of Concord, N. H., and daughter of the late J. W. Johnson, one of the commanding figures in the life of New Hampshire in his generation, died Tuesday after a long illness. Mrs. Hill received a part of her education at a private school at Brattleboro. With her husband she had been associated in the management of several hotel properties in New England, notably the Winslow House on Mt. Kearsarge, another at Maquam bay on Lake Champlain, and the Quincey House, Boston, of which her father was for many years, until his death, the owner and manager.

Mrs. Almira M. Morris died Thursday morning at the age of about 79 years. She was the widow of Ephraim Morris for many years one of the leading business men of Hartford, who amassed a large fortune and among other evidences of munificence built the Hartford public library. Mrs. Morris had been in failing health for a number of years and suffered at times severely with rheumatism. Her death was due to a cancerous trouble. Mrs. Morris had always been a woman of strong intellect and had been prominent in church, social and literary matters in the village. She leaves one sister, Mrs. Elbridge Thompson, of Lebanon, N. H., and two daughters, Mrs. Elmer M. Case of Hartford and Mrs. Roland E. Stevens with whom she has made her home since the death of her husband some years since.

FAIRFAX MAN FOUND GUILTY IN FRANKLIN COUNTY COURT TODAY. St. Albans, March 29.—In the case of William J. Trombley of Fairfax, charged with illegal selling, the jury in Franklin county court Saturday returned a verdict of guilty of one first offense. The jury was out nearly 24 hours. The charge was that of dispensing "Wassatakiquet Bitters" under such circumstances that it was known that improper use of the "Bitters" was intended. The jurors were discharged subject to call. The court cases will be taken up next week.

PEASE HAS NEW JOB. Secretary of Senator Dillingham Is Clerk in Senate. Burlington, March 29.—Ferdinand H. Pease, a Burlington boy, who has been private secretary for United States Senator William F. Dillingham, has been promoted to the position of clerk of the Senate committee on immigration to succeed Paul Dillingham, who has a desirable position with the transportation bureau of the Merchants' association of San Francisco.

VETERAN OF TWO WARS. Michael McCormack of Rutland, Vt., Dead, Aged 61. Rutland, March 29.—Michael McCormack, a retired soldier who had a record of 30 years' service in the U. S. army, died at his home here Saturday of pneumonia. McCormack was 61 years old, fought in the civil war, re-enlisted and later fought again in the war with Spain. He served with the 11th Infantry in Porto Rico and received, through Gen. Miles, a gold medal for merit in that campaign. He retired from the army soon after the war ended, and worked in the yard of the Rutland railroad company until his last sickness. Mr. McCormack is survived by a wife, a son and two sisters. The funeral will be held Monday in the church of the Holy Innocents.

FIRE AT NO. BENNINGTON. About a \$10,000 Loss There Early on Saturday. North Bennington, March 29.—The people in North Bennington were aroused Saturday morning about four o'clock by a fire in what was known as the Morris & Bonner store owned by W. J. Hurley at the foot of Main street. That building and contents were completely destroyed. The fire had made such headway in the interior of the building when discovered that it was impossible to save the building or any of its contents.

The fire was discovered by German Cicco whose store is only a few feet from the building. He immediately gave the alarm but before the engine got to work the building was a mass of flames both inside and out. Aside from the fire companies' hose, a line was run from the Stark Paper Co.'s mill, also one from the H. S. Walbridge Co.'s mill. The firemen, assisted by many citizens, worked with vigor and had a hard fight to protect the buildings of A. S. Hathaway on the north side and Cicco on the south.

The latter building was several times on fire and was practically ruined by fire and water. Hathaway's store was also somewhat damaged, to the extent of a few hundred dollars. The total loss is estimated at \$10,000, with a combined insurance of \$4,500. Morris & Bonner's stock was insured at \$200, which did not cover the loss. Cicco's insurance for building and stock amounted to \$1,800. No clue as yet has been found as to how the fire originated.
